

Atomic Planes Seen as Far Off

Scientist Doubts
Early Development

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—Don't expect any atomic powered planes in the next few years, "even if further work does indicate that it is feasible," Dr. Robert F. Bacher of the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission cautioned the Washington Academy of Sciences.

Denying a published statement that 99 percent of the theoretical work for such was completed, the scientist member of the commission conceded that the main problems are technical and engineering, not scientific.

But, he pointed out, the B-29 bomber took as long from design to production as did the atomic bomb.

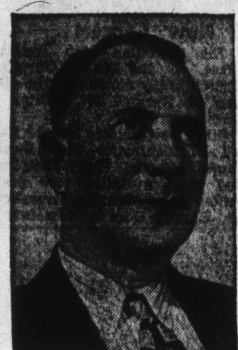

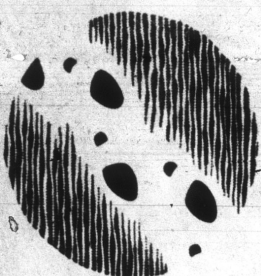
