

Lid Clamped On Gambling Here, in State

Police Watching For Parley Cards

Gamblers in Indianapolis and other Hoosier cities were under fire today as police officials opened holiday drives on betting rackets.

City police had their eyes cocked for Indiana high school basketball parlay cards. The gambling lid was being tightened down in New Castle and State Police at the Dunes Park Post made scrap metal of six fancy slot machines confiscated in raids on two Lake County taverns.

Inspector Leon Troutman of the Indianapolis Police Department disclosed that six details of police have been assigned to watch for the basketball gambling slips. Anyone found possessing the cards will be asked where they bought them and if they refuse to tell they will be taken to police headquarters. Police said arrests will be made when they find the sources.

Feud Continues

Meanwhile, in New Castle a feud continued today between city police and Sheriff Robert Padgett following the latter's raids on five cigar stores.

City officials charged the sheriff with "playing politics" but Sheriff Padgett declared the "lid was on to stay."

He charged Henry County Prosecutor Robert Brown was unwilling to file affidavits against the store operators for fear the action might lead to closing down gambling in local clubs and lodges.

Prosecutor Brown earlier had refused to file affidavits against the merchants on the sheriff's evidence, but said he would take the cases to the grand jury the first of the year.

In answer to city officials' demands that he clean up Henry County first and leave New Castle alone, Sheriff Padgett declared, "The gambling lid's on and will stay on if I have to deputize half the men in Henry County to enforce it. If there are any gaming devices in the county outside New Castle they must be well hidden, because I haven't found them and have had no complaints about their existence."

drant. Water sprayed over the street.

A police ambulance started for the scene of the accident. It was rerouted to another accident.

The city's second rescue squad arrived and took Mr. Lundstrom to the hospital.

Back at police headquarters, officials began preparing charges accusing Mr. Lundstrom of reckless driving.

Meanwhile, a battalion fire chief sped to the Carpenter home and burst into the house to help Billy.

Billy's father was surprised to see him.

"The horn?" he said. "Oh, I pulled that out of his throat myself a little while ago."

Sergeant Freed In Wife's Death

MARTINEZ, Cal., Nov. 25 (UP)—

Air Force Sergeant Kenneth Long, 26, was free today after a jury of 10 men and two women who heard his "truth serum" trial acquitted him of slaying his wife.

The jury brought in a not guilty verdict last night after deliberating more than 10 hours. Sgt. Long was charged with stabbing his wife, Barbara Jean Long, 22, to death in their Richmond, Cal., home last June 27, because she was in love with another man.

When the verdict was read, the courtroom broke into cheers. Sgt. Long wept. He was released.

At the trial the court allowed into the evidence a wire recording of a statement he made while under the influence of sodium pentothol, the so-called "truth drug." In his statement, Sgt. Long named William Peck, 24, a neighbor, as the real killer. But Mr. Peck established an alibi.

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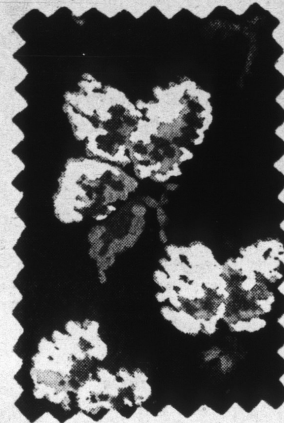
