The Fairview Presbyterian Church and many other congregations are working hard for the return of a religion-centered Christmas.

They are proceeding on the theory that a mind filled with the beauty and spiritual meaning of Christmas will have little inclination to dwell on an entirely material observance of the day.

Since the Feast of the Nativity came to the world through Jesus, a Jewish child who grew up in Palestine, Hebrew customs of 2000 years ago are receiving special mention now in the Fairview Sunday school.
