Pen Pals Meet After 28 Years


PLAINVILLE, Kas., Nov. 27 (UPI)—After 28 years, pen pals separated by half a continent have met.

"She was just as I felt sure she would be. After writing at least once a month since 1920, we're really known each other rather well."


The correspondence began as a classroom assignment by an English teacher.

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
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
