Boudreau Looks For 2d in Row

But Pitching Could Become A Cleveland Problem

IT IS NOT easy to win two major league baseball pennants in a row although it has been accomplished more than a few times down through the years. . . . But it's an ordeal to bear up under the wear and tear of a strenuous 154-game campaign and repeat the furious pace the following season. . . . Lou Boudreau, ace shortstop and manager of Cleveland's new world champions, has said repeatedly that his club will be up there again in 1949. . . . or thereabouts. . . . and for several years to come. . . . But a second championship in a row in baseball is unlikely. . . . at least it's against the law of averages. . . . The Cleveland players had to battle overtime to win their pennant this year and the strain told on them in the World Series. . . . Some of that 1948 zip could be lost forever. . . . The real Cleveland problem, if there is one next season, might be in the mound department. . . . Bob Feller has passed his peak. . . . He won 19 games in regular season in 1948 but he lost 14. . . . He is not the same old Feller and his second World Series start proved the point. . . . It means he'll have to be accorded longer tests between mound assignments next year. . . . Gene Bearden and Bob Lemon carried Cleveland's flag last season. . . . It's the history of baseball that one member of a winning mound tandem usually falls into a slump the following campaign. . . . But Lou Boudreau is going on the theory his club will be stronger in 1949. . . . Maybe he's right. . . . Wouldn't want to bet on it though. . . . Maybe he believes the Red Sox and the Yankees will be weaker a year hence. . . . And he's a better than fair observer in his chosen profession. . . . With the smooth operator, Cleveland President Bill Veech in his corner, Boudreau is sure of all-out backing.

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Georgia Smashes Tech 21 to 13; Bid to Bowl Game Cinched by Win

Rauch's Passes, Halfback's Line Smashing Lead Bulldogs to Title Before 53,000 Fans

ATHENS, Ga., Nov. 27—Georgia's bounding Bulldogs, tearing through huge holes through the line and eating up yardage on Johnny Rauch's passes, wrapped up a certain bowl bid today by slapping down Georgia Tech, 21 to 13 before 52,000 fans.

Quarterback Rauch, from Yeaton, Pa., and Jolting Joe Geri, halfback, banged together a spectacular offensive to give the Bulldogs their sixth straight league triumph.

Only the breaks and a fine-drawn courage kept Tech's Engineers in the game, but stay in they did and Georgia's victory was not certain until just before the finish, even though Georgia amassed a 14-0 halftime lead.

Tech narrowed the gap to 14 at the end of the first quarter. Commodores humbled Tennessee for the first time since 1937 today, running up a 28-to-6 victory.

After starting off sourly with two losses and a tie, Vandy has now won seven in a row. The Commodores will play Miami next week.

Vanderbilt won by tearing the heart out of Tennessee's secondary defense when it counted most and taking the best the Vols had to offer in a desperate battle on every tackle.

A lightning 43-yard pass play gave Vanderbilt a touchdown start in the first quarter. And then, after two scoreless periods, two more salted the game away before Tennessee could score.

Perhaps it was prophetic, but the sun, behind the clouds for 24 hours, broke out just as Herb Rich, halfback, took a scrimmage pass and skittered 43 yards down the right side line for his first score.

Long March Started
John Donaldson made first down on the Tech 21 with an end sweep. Geri ran for four and Rauch sneaked to a first down on the 10. Geri burst through to the five and Floyd Reid, on a wide end sweep, went across standing up. Geri kicked the first of his extra points.

Geri started a 92-yard Georgia march for the second score by running from his own eight to Tech's 47, a jaunt of 45 yards. Rauch tossed two straight first-down passes and with the ball on the 18, Geri ran for another first down on the four. Then Rauch again crossed up Tech, faking a sneak and handing to Johnny Tillitaki who scored easily as the second period started.

The Tech line that had been so bewildered during the two Georgia charges broke through to block the first of two Geri punts late in the second period. Dan Bradach knocking the ball back to Georgia's 29 where Tech recovered.

Punt Blocked for Score
But the engineers got nowhere that time and it wasn't until the third period that their stellar line-play paid off at all. Georgia was backed up deep after a clipping penalty and Geri tried to kick from his 5. Bill Bealy, All-America guard, threw his 200 pounds into the ball and it bounded back in the end zone where end George Brodnax recovered for the Tech touchdown.

Dinky Bowen kicked the point. Georgia came back banging harder than ever and drove down to the Tech 7 where the drive suddenly wilted. But on Tech's punt for better position, McCall, 165-pounder, gathered the ball in on his own 45 and raced through a cluster of tacklers for the third Georgia touchdown.
