A basketball and football letterman at Butler, he was captain of the football team in 1913. He was graduated in 1915. Following service in World War I, he returned to Butler to serve as acting graduate manager of athletics from 1920 to 1925.

Operator of a furniture store at Ritter Ave. and Washington St. eight years, he left Indianapolis to become an insurance company representative in Hartford, in 1933.

A native of Canada, he was the son of the Rev. Charles T. Paul, president of the College of Missions of the Disciples of Christ for 30 years.

Lady Graham-Moon, who was born in Dublin, and Capt. James Hodkinson, failed to appear in court today on her assault charge of Nov. 10.

The court said she telephoned a request that the charges be dropped, just as she did in October when she filed a similar charge against the captain. At that time she was asked why she permitted Capt. Hodkinson to knock her about.

Two Men Die in Fire After Plane Crashes

ALLISON, Ia., Nov. 27 (UP)—Two men were burned to death in a plane crash here today, shortly after attempting a crash landing after losing a wheel on takeoff.

CIO Board Opens

Leftwing Purge

Farm Equipment Union First Target

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 27 (UP)—The CIO executive board started its purge of small left-wing unions today by ordering the United Farm Equipment Workers to merge with the huge, right-wing United Automobile Workers Union.

Earlier this week the CIO National Convention authorized the board to take appropriate action to organize workers in fields where existing unions have failed.

The action was aimed primarily at small left-wing unions which were under heavy fire from CIO President Philip Murray and other right-wing officials all week.

A jurisdictional committee once before ordered the farm implement group to join the UAW but negotiations always broke down.

To guard against continued disagreement, the resolution provided that the executive board itself would carry out the decision if the unions cannot make their own arrangements within 60 days.

Kansas Digs in For New Blizzard

DODGE CITY, Kan., Nov. 27 (UP)—The Kansas highway patrol warned motorists tonight to "get off the highways in western Kansas and stay off," and indicated it feared loss of life in a new Midwestern blizzard.

Heavy snow, driven by 40 to 50-mile per hour winds, drifted roads shut and blanketed prairie land in western and central Kansas and northwestern Oklahoma today, only a week after the winter season's first blizzard at the Great Plains states.

The temperature in Dodge City at 6 p. m. was 29 degrees, and it was dropping rapidly. A high wind, measured at 40 and 45 miles per hour, and gusting at 50 miles an hour, was drifting city streets and disrupting power lines and communication.

Dodge City residents are readying the candles used to light their homes during the blizzard season. Electricity had failed several times in the city, but had been restored in short order.

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Charges Reds Lure U. S. Youth

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (UP)—A House committee research expert said tonight that schools and colleges should do more to guard American youth against the "frauds" of communism.

Benjamin Mandel, research director for the House Un-American Activities Committee, made the statement during a radio (ABC) interview.

Mr. Mandel said many American youths have become enmeshed in the web of Communist conspiracy. He said some have left school and home to follow the Communist will-o'-the-wisp.

Thus, he said, "the Communists have been responsible for a great number of personal tragedies, which have injured, sometimes irreparably, the youngster involved, and brought sorrow to his family."
