

# 10,000 Police To Protect Berlin Voters

## Red Army Recognizes Puppet City Regime

BERLIN, Dec. 3 (UP)—West Berlin's full force of 10,000 German police was being mobilized today to block any Communist attempt to break up the Sunday municipal elections which Soviet authorities outlawed in their sector.

Communist agitators had sought for three days to break up election rallies. West sector newspapers published warnings that they probably would try to interfere with the balloting on an administration rivaling the newly established government for the Soviet quarter.

The Russian military government officially recognized the new Communist puppet regime, announcing it would get all the Soviet help it needed to carry out its tasks.

## Make Money Reform

The final partition of Berlin into two cities crystallized further when the Western powers announced pending financial reforms. They would withdraw western support from the Soviet mark and let it fall to its own fate.

The western or legally elected city assembly met again today in extraordinary session to carry on plans for setting up new headquarters. It shifted over to West Berlin after the Communist move, which resulted in assembly officials being turned back from the city hall in the Russian sector.

Ten election rallies were scheduled in West Berlin today, and three more tomorrow.

## Reds Reinforce Police

The British-licensed newspaper Telegraph warned that the Communists were making a strong bid to scare Berliners away from the polls. Reports from the Soviet zone, it said, indicated additional police from nearby towns were being brought into the Russian sector to reinforce the police there.

## Gets 45-Year Term

WETUMPKA, Ala., Dec. 3 (UP)—A stocky 30-year-old man today faced a 45-year penitentiary sentence for the rape of a young woman.

A jury last night found John C. Howard Jr. guilty.

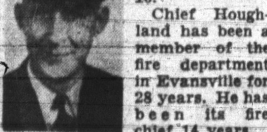
Howard was indicted by an Elmore County grand jury in September along with Jack Oliver, 20, of the same county.

He will succeed Fire Marshal Carter Bowser, who held office through the incumbent Republican administration.

# Detroit Driver Dies In Indiana Crash

OAKLAND CITY, Dec. 3—A Detroit, Mich., motorist was killed and a passenger in his car injured in an accident four miles north of here last night on Ind. 57.

The accident victim was Rupert Tyler, 39, who was driving north by a southbound truck which careened into the path of the Tyler car after sideswiping a northbound truck just ahead of the passenger vehicle.

The passenger in the Tyler car, Sarah Drake Edmonson, 39, also of Detroit, is in Wood Hospital here.

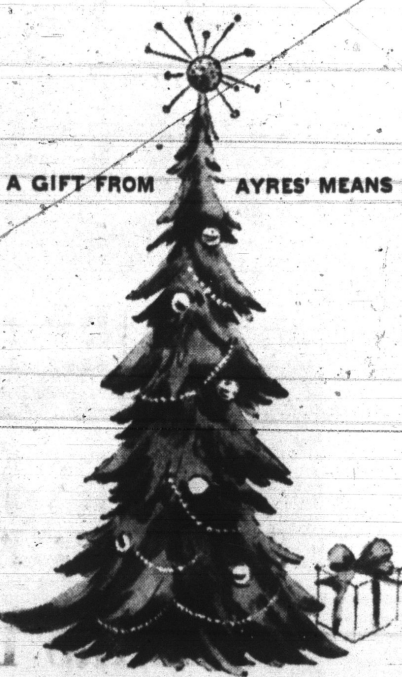
