Services for Mr. Cornman will be at 10 a. m. in Moore Mortuaries, Ben Davis Chapel. He was 75.

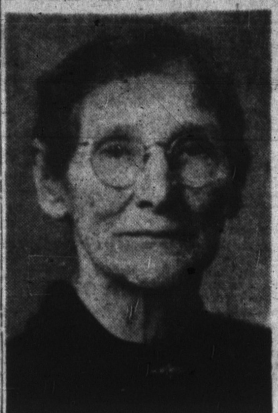
