

CO-ORDINATION is just as important as action in any situation. The Youth Conservation Council, representative of all the groups in the state interested in furthering youth movements, has set out to see that strides already made won't ever back track.

Reins of the organization are in the capable hands of Mrs. E. M. Dill, vivacious as a teenager when she's talking about her big interest—young people. When she was director of the Junior Red Cross' Indianapolis Chapter, she joined the council as the group's representative.

But probably her real enthusiasm for the movement began during the time her husband was superintendent of the Indiana Boys' School in Plainfield. Her own children grew up the 12 years Mr. Dill directed operations there.

Mrs. Dill draws her workers from the 20 organizations that send members to the council. They include the Indiana Federation of Clubs, Seventh District, IFC, State Teen Canteen, Indianapolis Woman's Department Club, Council of Church Women, Indianapolis Council of Women, Council of Social Agencies, Indiana and Indianapolis PTA's, Business and Professional Women, Council of Jewish Women, American Association of University Women, Council of Catholic Women, State Department of Conservation, YWCA, Junior Red Cross, Indiana Co-Operative Association, Indiana Photo Indorsers, Educational Department, Farm Bureau, League of Women Voters, American Legion Auxiliary and the Indiana Screen Council.

When Mrs. Dill isn't involved in council business, she's "homemaking" for her husband, head of the Dill Implement Co., and Bob, when he's home from school. They live in an apartment at 508 E. 29th St., where Mrs. Dill treasures her collection of old glass and precious family antiques.

The council will study children in institutions at its next meeting and already has re-
