

Connally Calls Hearings on Dean Acheson

2 Points Raised On Marshall Successor

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (UPI)—Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg (R. Mich.), and other leading Republicans today demanded a full investigation of Dean Acheson before Senate approves his nomination as the new Secretary of State.

Though there appeared no immediate threat to Senate confirmation of Gen. George C. Marshall's successor, Senators demanded full disclosures of these points:

ONE: Mr. Acheson's attitude toward Soviet Russia and the East-West "cold war" plus his viewpoint on State Department officials described by some critics as bad security risks.

TWO: His law firm's connections with the Communist government of Poland, and Mr. Acheson's personal relations with Alger and Donald Hiss, who have been charged with membership in a pre-war undercover Communist ring.

Chairman Tom Connally (D. Tex.) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee immediately moved to comply with these requests and tentatively planned public hearings for next week. Mr. Connally predicted that Mr. Acheson will be confirmed without much opposition.

Personal Choice

Both President Truman and close friends of Mr. Acheson insisted the appointment will not mean a milder policy toward the Soviets. Mr. Acheson was among the first to advocate a "firm but patient attitude toward Russia."

Meanwhile, Sen. Homer Caphart (R. Ind.) asserted that the Acheson appointment proved the bi-partisan foreign policy is dead. He said the fact that no Republicans were consulted about the appointment in advance was "another slap" at bi-partisanship.

"We'll look the Acheson appointment over very, very carefully," Mr. Caphart said.

The same view was voiced by Sen. Owen Brewster (R. Me.). Mr. Brewster said Mr. Acheson was an able man, but he wondered whether the appointment meant that U. S. "cold war" policy toward Russia was "now going to get soft."


