## Walsh May Go On Prober Group

Eyes Un-American  
Activities Committee

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10—Freshman Democratic Rep. John R. Walsh, Anderson, Ind., may take Mississippi Rep. John Rankin's place on the House Un-American Activities Committee, it was learned today.

A close friend of Alex Campbell, Ft. Wayne, who now heads the criminal division in the Justice Department, Mr. Walsh talked the matter over with both Mr. Campbell and Attorney General Tom Clark.

Since he is one of the few Democratic newcomers who expressed a desire to be on the highly controversial committee, the administration forces may back him, it was said. They want a committee in this Congress that will co-operate and not just compete with the Justice Department and the FBI, it was pointed out.

Mr. Walsh may be named the Rankin successor shortly by Speaker Sam Rayburn.

Devotes Page to Walsh  
The Washington Post selected Mr. Walsh as the "typical new Democratic congressman" and devoted a full page with pictures to his coming here.

In an interview he expressed his preference for the Un-American Activities Committee. He explained his reasons for making such a selection in a weekly news letter from his office to the Fifth District constituents today.

"I have received several hundred letters from the district urging me to support the continuance of the House Un-American Activities Committee," Mr. Walsh said. "My reply to these letters has been that I shall support the efforts of those who wish to continue the committee and to expand its scope. This committee is needed to keep under close watch all forms of totalitarian un-Americanism."

Mr. Walsh is a former deputy attorney general of Indiana.

# Tientsin Fall Near; Guard 70 Americans

Group Ordered to  
Consult Safety

SHANGHAI, Jan. 10 (UP)—Telephone reports from Tientsin said today that 70 Americans left there had been ordered to seek protection in the American consulate in anticipation that the city would fall to the Communists in two days.

These reports said that attacking Communist forces of 225,000 men, including 75,000 reinforcements, had fought their way through the city's defense ring and captured the north railway station.

The north station is inside the protective dike that surrounds the city. The inner Nationalist defense ring around Tientsin was placed just behind the dike.

Expect Early Fall of City  
These reports said there was sufficient Communist strength around and in the city to deliver the coup de grace at any time. Most observers expected the city to fall within 24 to 48 hours.

The 70 Americans still left here, most of whom refused offers of evacuation because they represented commercial firms, have been ordered to move under the protection of the American consulate in the Leopold building, the city's largest structure.

The 120 British Nationals have withdrawn into their homes inside the city. Families in a number of cases have doubled up to accommodate those who were forced out of their mansions in the vicinity of the race course.

Food Prices Skyrocket  
National flags have been painted on the gates and buildings of all American, British and French property. In addition to the Americans and British, there are 50 French, 60 Greek, 800 Soviet Russians and 150 stateless persons in Tientsin.

Prices of food and coal have skyrocketed since the Communist attack started, with a 200-pound bag of coal selling for about \$25 in American money.

Reports that the Communist commanders have promised their troops permission to sack certain sections of the city, however, have caused the bottom to drop out of the luxury market.

Seek Big Four Aid  
A four-man city council mission which went into Communist lines with a peace appeal returned and announced their mission was a failure. They said the Communist commanders refused to see or talk to them.

A qualified official source in Nanking, meanwhile, confirmed that the Chinese government of Premier Sun Fo made formal approaches over the week-end to ambassadors of the U. S., Britain, France and Russia for their help in mediating a truce with the Communists.

Heavy Communist artillery fire also was directed against Peiping during the week-end. Reports from Peiping said it was believed to be an effort to draw out the Nationalist artillery so it would answer and reveal its position.

# Hoffmann Demands Quick Action on Juvenile Center

Judge Urges Commissioners to Provide  
\$12,500 for 'Long Overdue' Repairs

Juvenile Court Judge Joseph O. Hoffmann today asked Marion County commissioners for immediate appropriation of \$12,500 to make "long overdue" repairs to the Juvenile Center.

In a sharp letter to the commissioners the judge said his court was "seriously disturbed" about physical conditions at the center. He reminded commissioners of requests dating back to May of 1948 for "immediate" repairs and pointed out that three separate grand juries have condemned conditions at the center.

Security Impaired  
The judge added that immediate repairs and reconditioning were urgent because the security of the center is now impaired by broken wire guards and rotting doors.

"It will mean that the Center will be able to hold boys and girls who are now being confined in jail," he said.

Meanwhile, County Commissioner William Bosson said the commissioners had not yet received the request. He said only appropriation now included in the 1949 budget was \$800 to repair floors and paint. The sum was requested by the commissioners in October out the appropriation was refused by the County Council.

Mr. Bosson said the commissioners had "complied with every request" of the court and passed it on to the council. A spokesman for the court, however, denied this and said "repeated written and oral requests" to the commissioners had received no action on any other than the October request for roofing and floor repairs.

"Actually, they receive the grand jury reports and there's no reason we should have to point out these things," Charles Boswell, chief probation officer for the court, said. "It is the duty of the commissioners to maintain these buildings and that duty is not being carried out."
