

Slain Bandit Linked to Eight Other Holdups



Victims View Body, Recognize Madden

Daniel S. Madden, the hold-up man who was shot and killed in a gun battle Saturday morning after a grocery robbery, was identified as having committed at least eight other robberies. Chief of Detectives Jack O'Neal said.

Madden's body was viewed in the City morgue by victims and witnesses who said they recognized him. Chief O'Neal said detectives were checking 20 other cases in which Madden was believed to be involved.

Identification Made

Horse Player Hits Radio Jackpot Of \$30,500

SPARROWS POINT, Md., Jan. 10 (UPI)—Horse player John Oaks said today that winning \$30,500 in prizes on the radio program "Stop the Music" felt "just like hitting the daily double."

Mr. Oaks, a railroad superintendent, won the jackpot last night when he correctly identified the mystery melody as "When the Bridegroom Comes." It was the biggest jackpot in the program's history, according to the American Broadcasting Co.

"I took it just as calm as you please," he said. "You see, I've hit a couple of daily doubles, big ones, at the Laurel race track."

Mr. Oaks credited his wife with identifying the mystery tune. He said he just happened to answer the telephone. He was the 56th person called in the six-week search for someone who knew the tune.

The list of prizes included a \$1000 U. S. savings bond; a \$2500 diamond bracelet watch; a \$1000 piano; a \$3000 diamond ring; a \$2000 living room set; a \$1500 string of pearls; a \$1800 mink stole; a \$100 linen trousseau; a \$1200 sterling silver service; a two-week all-expense vacation in Palm Springs, Cal., and a 1949 Kaiser sedan.

Court Picks Greene As Investigator

Jacob M. Greene, former chief jailer during the term of Sheriff Albert Magenheimer, today was named as investigator in Marion County Criminal Court 2.

Tientsin Fall Near; Guard 70 Americans

Group Ordered to Consulate Safety

SHANGHAI, Jan. 10 (UPI)—Telephone reports from Tientsin said today that 70 Americans left there had been ordered to seek protection in the American consulate in anticipation that the city would fall to the Communists in two days.

These reports said that attacking Communist forces of 225,000 men, including 75,000 reinforcements, had fought their way through the city's defense ring and captured the north railway station.

The north station is inside the protective dike that surrounds the city. The inner Nationalist defense ring around Tientsin was placed just behind the dike.

Expect Early Fall of City.

These reports said there was sufficient Communist strength around and in the city to deliver the coup de grace at any time. Most observers expected the city to fall within 24 to 48 hours.

The 70 Americans still left there most of whom refused offers of evacuation because they represented commercial firms, have been ordered to move under the protection of the American consulate in the Leopold building, the city's largest structure.

The 120 British Nationals have withdrawn into their homes inside the city. Families in a number of cases have doubled up to accommodate those who were forced out of their mansions in the vicinity of the race course.

Food Prices Skyrocket

National flags have been painted on the gates and buildings of all American, British and French property. In addition to the Americans and British, there are 50 French, 60 Greek, 800 Soviet Russians and 150 stateless persons in Tientsin.

Prices of food and coal have skyrocketed since the Communist attack started, with a 200-pound bag of coal selling for about \$25 in American money.

Seek Big Four Aid

A four-man city council mission went into Communist lines with a peace appeal returned and announced their mission was a failure. They said the Communist commanders refused to see or talk to them.

A qualified official source in Nanking meanwhile, confirmed that the Chinese government of Premier Sun Fo made formal approaches over the week-end to ambassadors of the U. S., Britain, France and Russia for their help in mediating a truce with the Communists.

Heavy Communist artillery fire also was directed against Peiping during the week-end. Reports from Peiping said it was believed to be an effort to draw out the Nationalist artillery so it would answer and reveal its position.

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Bitter wintry weather and storms will grip most of the nation for the next 24 hours, according to the Weather Bureau.
