Let's Eat— Omelet That Turns Green Is Harmless

Remedy: Don't Beat
Whites Too Much

AN EXPERIENCED cook in an eastern city recently bought a fancy copper-bottomed skillet from her favorite department store. Since the skillet was a perfect size and shape for an omelet to serve her family, that was what she first used it for.

To her great surprise she turned out a mysteriously green omelet onto the platter. She immediately concluded the omelet was poisonous and that the skillet had caused it. She returned the skillet to the store and reported her experience to the salesperson who was able to explain why she had obtained such a result.

This homemaker had learned the importance of not beating the whites to the point where they become dry in appearance. In order to get the biggest, puffed omelets, the green color on the bottom of such an omelet is due to the fact that some of the egg separates out either after the beaten whites and yolks are combined and stand around a little while before cooking, or the whites are not beaten sufficiently, or the beaten yolks and beaten whites are not blended thoroughly.

Milk to drink: One quart for each child, one pint for each adult. In addition to that used in the day's menu.
STAY-PUFF OMELET
3 tbsps. butter or margarine
3 tbsps. flour
1/2 c. milk
1/2 tsp. salt
4 eggs, separated
1/2 tsp. salt
2 tbsps. shortening for skillet
Prepare a thick white sauce from the first four ingredients. Cool. Beat the egg yolks slightly, add white sauce and three-fourths teaspoon salt and beat thoroughly to blend. Then fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites. Heat shortening over low heat in an 8-inch skillet. Pour in the omelet mixture. Level surface gently, and cover with a domed-shaped lid greased on the inside.

This will allow the omelet to rise without sticking to the top. Cook over very low heat for 15 to 20 minutes or until a light brown crust is formed on the bottom. Lift slightly at the side with a spatula to make sure omelet is cooked through. Loosen the omelet from the sides of the skillet and cut through the center to the crust but not through it, and slide onto a hot platter. Pour Spanish sauce over top. Serves four.

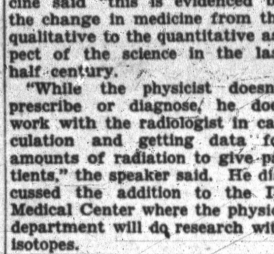


A WELL-PLACED "SIR" GOES A LONG WAY TOWARD MAKING A GOOD IMPRESSION ON A PARENT.

Three Speak At Women's Council Today

James Durlacher
Discusses Physics
Physics has become more and more vital to medicine, James Durlacher told the Indianapolis Council of Women today at the monthly meeting in Ayres' Auditorium.
"While the physicist doesn't prescribe or diagnose, he does work with the radiologist in calculation and getting data for amounts of radiation to give patients," the speaker said. He discussed the addition to the IU Medical Center where the physics department will do research with isotopes.
The program of Indiana services for crippled children was declared "sound" by Miss Mildred Pauline Beard. "Not only does our program make it possible for boys and girls receiving care to grow into happy, healthy adults, but it makes these children self-supporting and self-sufficient adults," the editor of "Public Welfare in Indiana" said.
Slides shown by Miss Beard included the cerebral palsy clinic at Riley and other clinics in Ft. Wayne, Gary, South Bend and Evansville.
"That a city, like a house, expresses its keeper" was the theme of the talk of Charles Mosier of the Civic Pride Committee. The problem is cigarette and candy wrappers thrown on city streets by citizens, Mr. Mosier said.
He reminded his audience that a city is kept untidy by citizens, not city officials. "The citizens must take action to keep city pride intact."
Mrs. Claude Franklin, legislative chairman, reviewed status of General Assembly bills being backed by the council.

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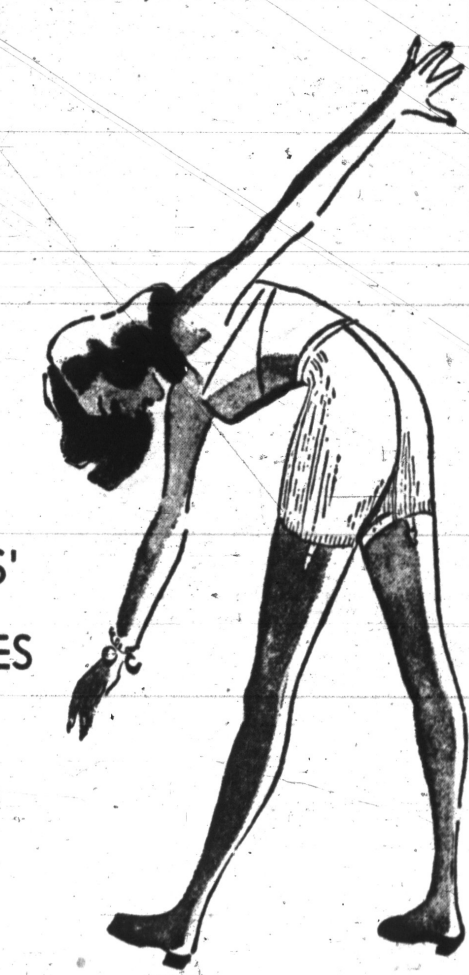
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
