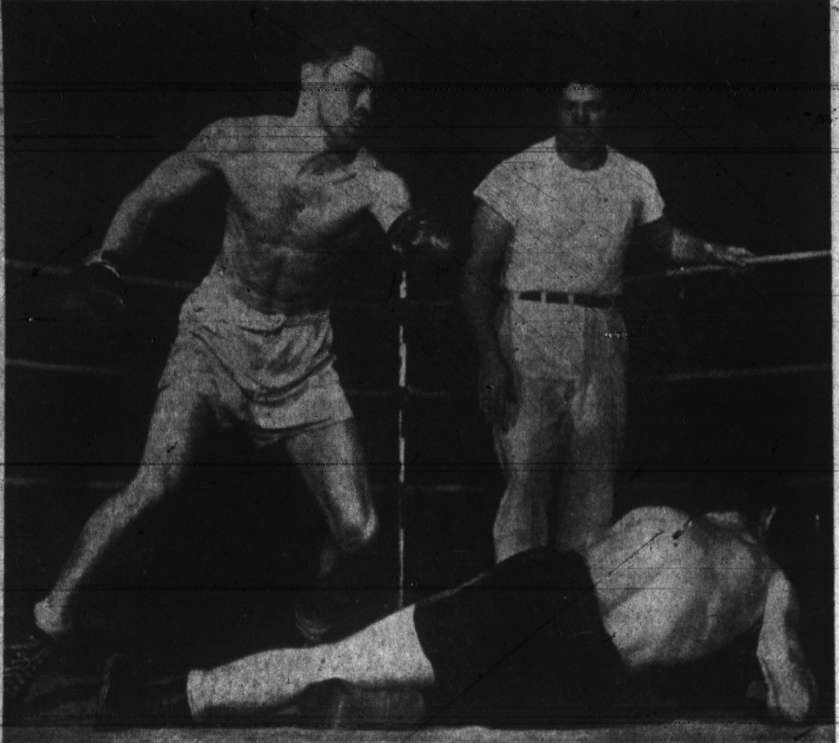

Ohio University Seeking Revenge at Butler Tonight

Previous Battle at Athens, O., Ended With One-Point Victory for Favored Bulldogs

Ohio University enters the basketball arena tonight to try its luck for the second time against the Bulldogs of Butler at 8:15 in Fieldhouse.

Butler bested the Bobcats last week in Athens, O., 54 to 53, as Bob Evans sank a last-minute field goal. It was a surprise ending since the Bulldogs were heavily favored to build a top-heavy score.

Butler currently stands seventh in the country according to the Dick Dunkel ratings, and has a three game victory streak to protect. Ohio on the other hand, has suffered six consecutive defeats since Jan. 7 when they bounced Western Reserve, 77 to 46.

Butler's "Invincible," Bill Shepherd, Buckshot O'Brien and Evans are nearly returned to their physical peak. All three saw action in the Notre Dame game Monday, although each was nursing an injury.

Tonight's game will be the fifth conference game for Butler. The Bulldogs are at the top of the MAC heap with four victories and no losses.

Ohio stands fifth in the league with a record of one win and four losses.

Golden Gloves Field Pared To 33

Survivors Begin Serious Training For Final Session Next Week

James Watkins Pounds Out Decisive Win in Open Heavyweight Division

More determined than ever to smash their way to a Golden Gloves championship, 33 youngsters—those still eligible to bid for a crown—began serious training today for the final session of this year's classic.

Sixteen spunky youths were eliminated in the semi-finals last night at the Armory before a bellowing crowd of 3055.

Some cheered their choices on to victory while others saw their favorites dropped from competition. But those who were dropped went out of the picture swinging and proved they could take a little punishment as well as dish it out as they had done in earlier sessions.

And last night's round turned out to include everything promised by The Times-Legion Committee—a maximum of astute fury.

There were 16 bouts, 10 of which ended in decisions by judges Frank Arford, Ed Clemens, Tony Coppi, William Shine, Bernie Connelly, Fred Kruke, a lot of close ones to call. Three ended by TKO, two by KO and one by default.

Also aiding in calling the decisions were Referees Lou Thomas and Dick Patton.

Thirteen of the bouts were in the Novice Class and three were Open.

For the first time in this 16th Times-Legion event, the heavyweights got their chance. And last night they came especially heavy.

Winner in the final bout was James Watkins, Leeper's Gym, who tips the scales at an even 255. But the excess poundage, which included a sizable ring of fat around the middle, didn't hinder Watkins.

Gets Decisive Victory He punched out a decisive victory over Connie Coe, Jackson's Gym, who had been one of the favorites in the Open class.

In the other scheduled Open class heavyweight encounter, Marvin Keller, Jackson's Gym, won by default over William Bell, Northwestern PAL.

The championship battle for the heavyweight crown and the chance to represent Indianapolis on the team which goes to the Chicago tournament will be next Friday between Watkins and Keller.

Keller hasn't had an opportunity to display his ability before fans this year, but from all indications, this will be one of the top bouts of the final round.

"Barrister" Wins The "Battling Barrister," Richard Sanders, Franklin College law student who is doing battle with the Ace Exterminator team, slugged his way into the finals in one of the top fights seen thus far in the tournament.

He won a decision over Glenn Sosbe of Jackson's Gym, but not easily. Sosbe, a well-conditioned lad who isn't an easy man to keep down, came back in the second round after being knocked down in the first to pepper Sanders with rights and lefts that surprised the Franklin student.

Sanders made the first-round knockdown with a looping right that caught Sosbe on the side of the head. Sosbe came back in the second to stagger Sanders twice with hard rights and lefts in the in-fighting.

Plays Smart Game Sanders played a smart game in the final round and stayed away from Sosbe except to dance in and land hard rights to the head.

In the first Open class fight of the card, Andy Anderson, Leeper's Gym, decisively out-boxed, out-slugged and out-classed Stanley Zuremski, Ft. Benjamin-Harrison, in the 147-pound division.

Zuremski attempted to out-run Anderson in a clowning dance about the ring, but was caught numerous times, the ropes only to be belted by Anderson's right and left.

Prize for the most work of the evening should go to Mack Sheard of the Senate Ave. YMCA team. Sheard won the opening bout of the evening by a decision and the evening came back in the 15th bout to win again by a knockout. He did double duty and got his crack at the 126-pound Novice title.

Wins Two Fights In his first fight last night, he won a close decision over Buford Tinsley, Ace Exterminators. In his second he knocked out Richard McKinney, Rhodius PAL, in 1:00 of the second round.

Charles McKinney, Ace Exterminators, won his second bout, a 126-pound Novice round, by a third-round technical knockout of Carl Starkey, Columbus, Ind.

Referee Thomas stopped the fight after Ham had beaten his opponent from post to post.

Roy (Pee Wee) Bryant, a spunky fighter as has stepped into the ring this evening, dropped a decision to Roy Bryant, Northeast Community Center, after he had hit the canvas twice in the first round and once in the second. It was in the 112 Novice class.

Next Fights at 8:15 Willard Conger, Ace Exterminators, beat his way into the finals of the 147-pound Novice class by knocking out Charles Knox, Northwestern PAL, in 1:48 of the second round.

As that class goes into the finals it remains a toss-up as to who will take the title. Ben Sowell, Senate Ave. YMCA, put down Mack Carroll, Northwestern PAL, for the full count at 1:07 of the third round.

Next week's final round will begin at 8:15 p.m. instead of the usual 8 p.m., the committee announced.

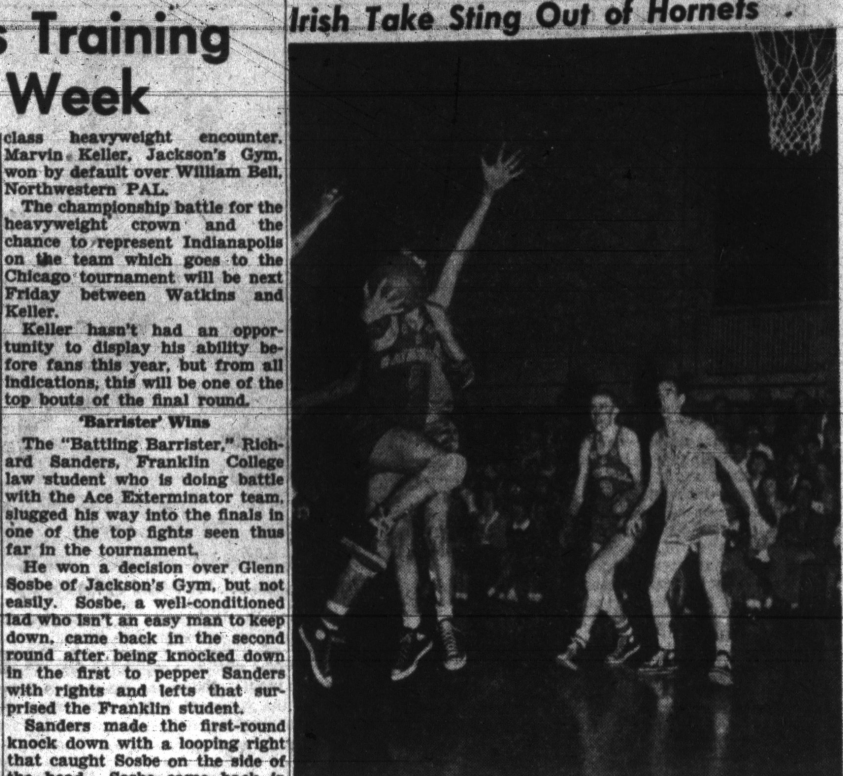

Nine of the city and county's prep combinations will try it again tonight with at least two teams each in the city and county looking for another chance to fatten their season's slates.
