This pair routine is only one of many highlights of The Times Ice-O-Rama which will raise money for the Infantile Paralysis Fund Feb. 24 in the Fairgrounds Coliseum.

Some 600 Indianapolis amateur skaters will take part in the two-hour extravaganza. Again it will give all the glamour of a professional show. Million Facing Philly Tie-up

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 8 (UP)—More than one million daily commuters were faced today with threatened strikes that would halt virtually all public transportation in the Philadelphia metropolitan area.

The 11,000 operating and maintenance workers on the city's transit lines have threatened to walk off their jobs midnight Thursday unless agreement has been reached on a new contract.

The 3,500 drivers for the Yellow Cab Co. voted last night to strike next Monday midnight unless a new contract was signed by that time. The company operates approximately 2,000 cabs.

If both threatened walkouts went into effect and continued into an overlap, it would leave commuters, shoppers and school pupils with only a few independent cabs, railroad service and private automobiles in the city's worst travel stoppage since horse-car days.

New Castle Pets Under Quarantine

NEW CASTLE, Feb. 8—Mayor Harold L. Meadows ordered a four-month quarantine of dogs and cats yesterday in a precautionary move to reduce the growing rabies threat here.

Upon the recommendation of Dr. C. C. Bitler, city health officer, Mayor Meadows ordered owners to keep pets tied up, inside or muzzled if they run loose. Unmuzzled animals may be destroyed at the city dog pound if they are not claimed after three days.

One veterinarian here disclosed he had seen six dogs suspected of rabies in the last week. Three heads of the animals were sent to the State Board of Health Sunday. Three others examined earlier showed positive reports.

Methodists Buy At Speedway City

Cost of First Unit Put at \$30,000

Methodists of Speedway City have purchased a tract of ground on W. 16th and Presto Sts. and are planning to build a church, parsonage and educational building.

The congregation which is now worshipping in the Speedway Theater is closing the deal today for two lots in the named location. The membership already owned two others there, making a total of four lots in the 180 by 175 ft. tract. Charles Bahne is chairman of the church finance committee and secretary of the board of trustees.

Officials report that ground will be broken in the summer for the first unit to cost about \$30,000. A decision has not yet been reached regarding which unit is to be built first. A plan is to be chosen from the book of the Methodist Board of Church Extension and a local architect employed to complete the drawings.

One thing is certain, officials said, adequate space will be set aside for off-street parking to meet the requirements of the planning commission.

The new church has been approved by Bishop Richard C. Raines of the Indiana Area and the Rev. Frederick Pedersen of the Board of Church Extension. The Rev. Joseph Walton of Clermont is the pastor and Dr. Buel Horn of New Castle, superintendent of the New Castle district.

Charged With Pulling Knife on Cab Driver

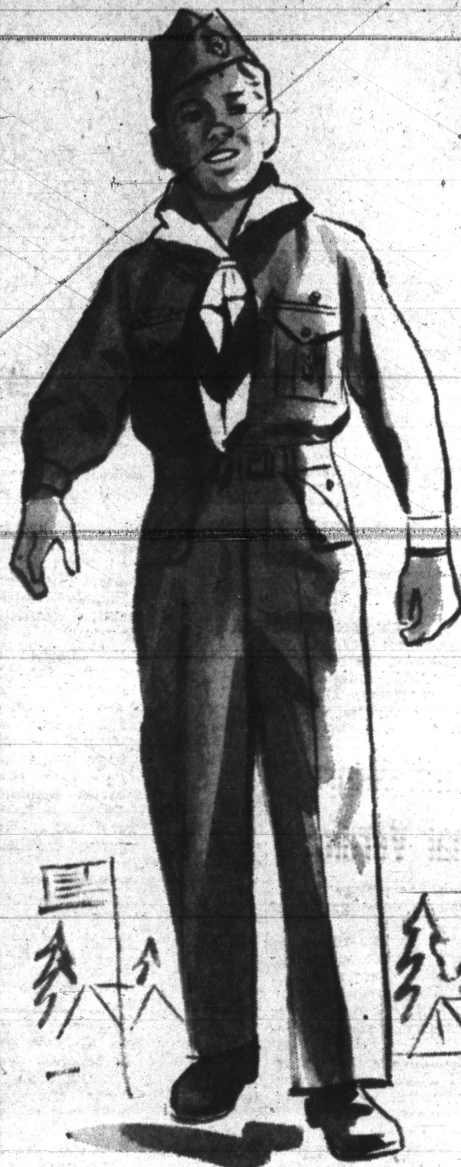

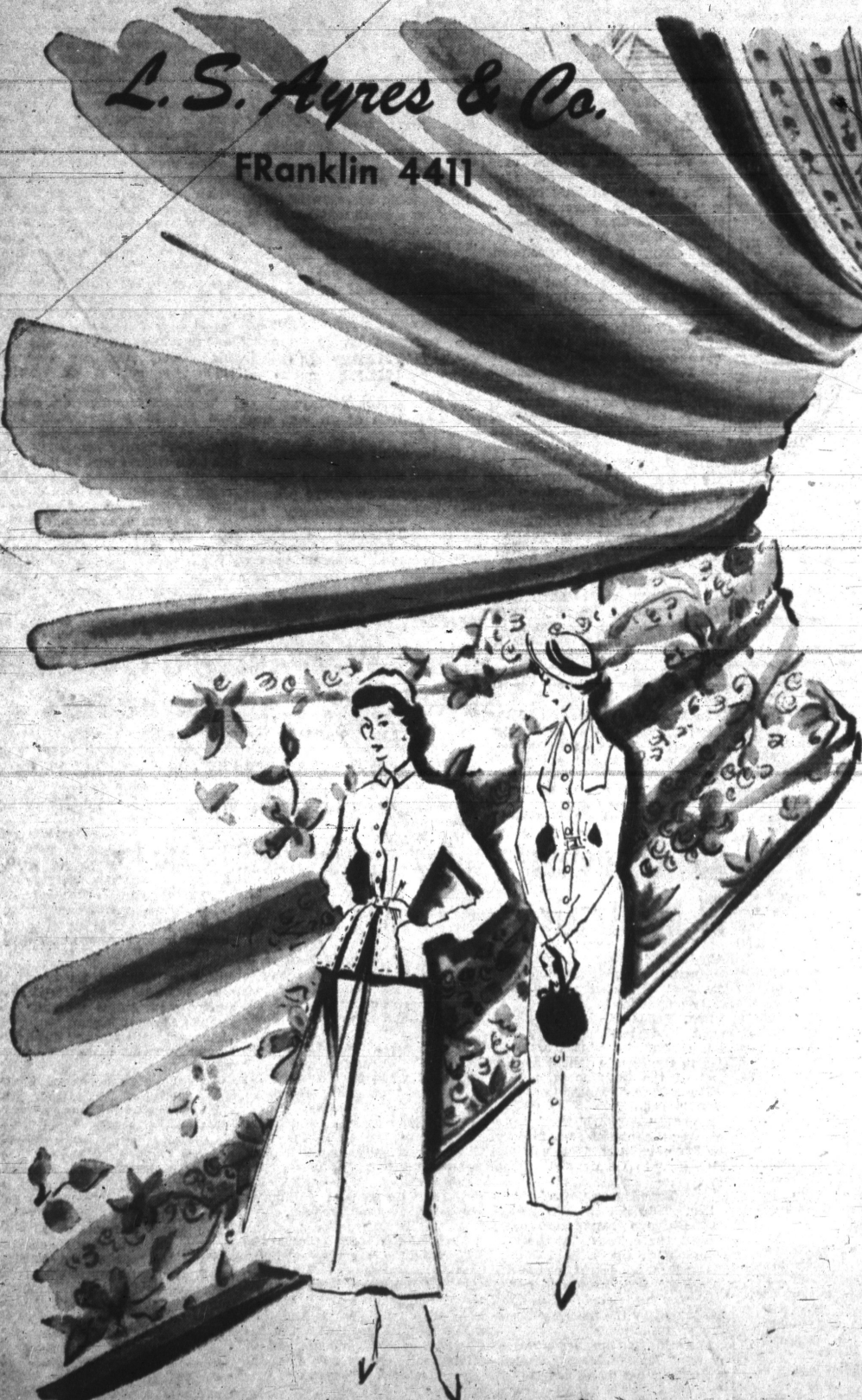
