

GOP Dinner Talks Roast Democrats

Halleck, Jenner Rap
Party at Banquets

Moosier Republicans were in the midst of a series of annual Lincoln Day banquets today, a series that attracted from Washington two top Indiana GOP members of Congress.

Sen. William E. Jenner and Rep. Charles A. Halleck, the former House majority leader, came home to speak last night. Mr. Jenner was at Richmond and Mr. Halleck was at Valparaiso.

Mr. Halleck blasted the Truman administration, charging that "costly bureaucratic government" under the Democrats was "smothering individual liberty and productive ingenuity."

Mr. Jenner said the Democrats were betraying their campaign promises to farmers and said GOP leadership had an opportunity to fight for "economic justice" to agriculture.

Mr. Halleck speaks at Rochester tonight.

Bill Would Ban Ads by Dentists

A public hearing on a bill to prohibit dentists from advertising price, cost, charge or fee for services was held today by a committee of the House of Representatives.

Officials for the Indiana State Dental Association told committee members Indiana and Nebraska are the only states which do not have a law prohibiting advertising by dentists.

Dr. E. A. W. Montgomery of Evansville told the representatives, "The purpose is to eliminate 'bait advertising,' whereby the advertiser quotes some ridiculously low fee to attract patients to his office and then by high pressure salesmanship sells the patients on fees that are equal to or above those charged by other practitioners."

Thieves Rifle Jewelry Plating Co. Here

Thieves rifled the Miles Gold & Silver Plating Co., 115 S. Capitol Ave., last night and took an unestimated amount of jewelry. Police said the jewelry was the property of several stores and that Miles Co. officials could not make estimate of its value.

Senators Consider Jobless Pay Bill

Stiffer Opposition
Seen in GOP Chamber

An Indiana Senate committee was today considering the controversial unemployment compensation bill which passed the House yesterday, 69 to 25.

Stiffer opposition to the administration-backed measure is expected in the Senate, where Republicans predominate.

The bill as passed yesterday would increase maximum unemployment compensation benefits from \$20 a week for 20 weeks to \$25 a week for 25 weeks and would liberalize many other benefits of the present act.

Rep. Lothar Testor (R. Hagerstown), an opponent of the bill, said it would cost Indiana employers an additional \$8 million annually.

Farnsworth Corp. Sold to IT&T

Fr. Wayne Firm
Electronics Pioneer

FT. WAYNE, Feb. 10 — The Farnsworth Television & Radio Corp., one of the pioneers in the electronics field, was sold yesterday to the International Telephone & Telegraph Co.

The deal called for the exchange of one share of I. T. & T. for 12 shares of Farnsworth, subject to stockholder approval. I. T. & T. closed yesterday at \$9.25 a share and Farnsworth closed at \$2.87.

I. T. & T. also will advance \$1 million to Farnsworth to meet debts and provide operating capital.

I. T. & T. announced it would operate the plant and maintain the distributor and dealer organization which handles its product under the name of Capehart.

Farnsworth also owned and operated WGL, a radio station and an experimental television station both of which have been sold subject to FCC approval.

Legalize Action Taken on Holidays

Senate Passes Bill
Under Suspension

The state Senate today introduced and passed under suspension of rules a bill which would legalize any action taken by the Legislature on a legal holiday.

The measure was introduced to make certain the legality of any action taken in a session on Lincoln's birthday Saturday or on Washington's birthday Feb. 22 will not be questioned.

The measure was sent to the House where it also received similar speedy action so that it might reach the Governor's desk for signature before the Saturday session.

Limits Use of Hall. At the same time the Senate passed by a unanimous vote a measure which will limit use of the new legislative chambers solely to the General Assembly.

The measure, a resolution, was passed by the House yesterday. However, the Senate added some amendments which will now require approval of the House.

Senators would have the \$700,000 chambers under control of the Legislative Bureau and the lieutenant governor during off years.

It was believed by legislators that if other agencies of the state used the rooms they might cause damage through carelessness.
