WITH A PARTIAL score, competitive bidding sometimes gets mighty ticklish. After Mr. Champion opened today's hand with one heart, Mr. Dale could not be said to have a typical "book" overall. But the old boy is not one to sit idly by while his opponents sneak out with a game. He took a chance on a bad loss when he bid one spade. But bad as the loss could have been, the chance of its happening were remote, so Mr. Dale was right in there.

Had Mr. Dale passed, Mr. Masters would have been absolutely fixed after Mrs. Keen made her normal bid of two hearts. As it was, he was very glad to raise his partner's spade bid.

Mrs. Keen was in quite a quandary concerning her second bid. She suspected Mr. Dale might not be able to make two spades and she was right. But it was too close to double. The best she could hope for by passing was a score of 50 points. On the other hand, if her partner could somehow manage to make three hearts, the resulting game would be worth over 400 points. Raising the hearts once more.

### Three Hearts Weren't in the Cards

Well, three hearts just weren't in the cards. Mr. Dale opened the six of spades and Mr. Masters won and returned the deuce of clubs. Declarer played low and Mr. Dale won the queen and followed with the ace. He then led a diamond to his partner's ace. Mr. Masters now led a third round of clubs, which Mr. Dale refused. That was all, but it was enough.

THE DREAM of parent-teacher co-operation that began officially back in 1897 is enthusiastically fostered today by three PTA presidents in this area. They are Mrs. Joseph Walker, Greenfield, head of the Indiana Congress of Parents and Teachers; Mrs. Clifford Van Cleave, president of the Marion County Parent-Teacher Association; and Mrs. Earl Stumpf, "prexy" of the Indianapolis Parent-Teacher group. This month, their groups are celebrating the founding of PTA.

Conceived by Mrs. Alice McLellan Birney and Mrs. Phoebe Apperson Hearst, both of Washington, the "dream" came to Indiana in 1912. Mrs. Fred Hoke was the first president. Now Mrs. Walker, in the first year of her three-year term as president, guides 984 local associations. She became interested in the organization first as an English and Latin teacher, then as the mother of two children. Nancy Nell is a freshman at Purdue University now, and John Ward has junior class standing at Indiana.

In her personal life she thoroughly has carried out the two main aims of the PTA—child welfare and adult education. An officer in the Riley Old Home Society in Greenfield, active in Boy and Girl Scouting and church work, Mrs. Walker climaxed a 15-year PTA career when she was elected last spring. The state group directly sponsors workshops at Indiana, parent institutes at Purdue and legislative institutes when the State Assembly is to meet. It fosters a scholarship program to encourage local organizations in that respect, and just lately it was responsible for the purchase of a bi-plane fluoroscope at Riley Hospital. It also sponsors adult education study groups.

MRS. WALKER also must keep in touch with the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Ben S. Watt, for she's the official intermediary between the state and the parents. On a county level, Mrs. Van Cleave holds sway over 35 schools. She must contact them all, keep them informed of current PTA activities in their behalf. Head of both the county PTA board and council, she also is a member of committees such as the audio-visual aid. She's shown examining new films with Mrs. Raymond A. Wright, first vice president of the county group, and Robert F. Gladden, county superintendent of schools.

Mrs. Walker beats Mrs. Van Cleave by only two years in PTA service. The latter, who manages a household at 6115 E. 16th St., has two daughters, Shirley Jean, 18, and Ruth Ann, 14. She's especially interested in the "summer roundup" and the health conference the county sponsors each fall.

Mrs. Stumpf, 232 E. Southern Ave., describes her job as a "trouble shooter." She sits in on local association board meetings, represents the PTA on civic committees. And she loves to "just drop in" on one of the 79 elementary schools under her jurisdiction or help to settle a problem arising from one of "her" six high schools. Friends say her enthusiasm for PTA is unbounded.

LIKE MRS. WALKER, she's interested in activities derived from PTA. In Camp Fire activities for eight years, she fishes with "Daddy" when there is time or takes overnight camping trips with Camp Fire friends. Her daughter, Mary Lu, 18, was graduated from Technical High School last month.

High points on the Indianapolis PTA program are the annual health conference and the Founders Day presidents' tea which will be Thursday this year. The city also has a vital scholarship plan which Mrs. Stumpf and Miss Gertrude Buscher, principal of School 25, are explaining to two pupils there, Kathryn Weiland and Carolyn Smith. The county Founders Day observance will be Feb. 28.
