## Regains Crown; Hint Rubber Match Due in June

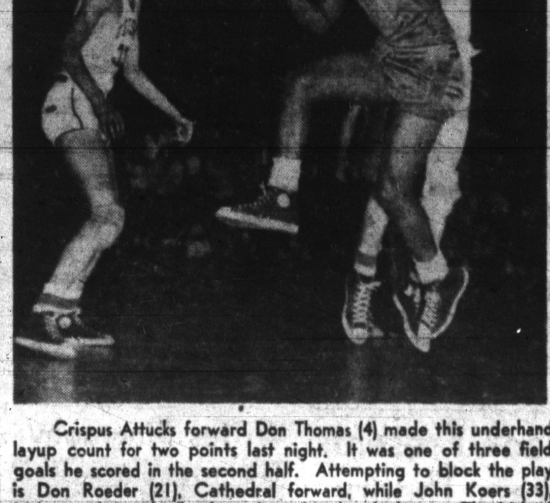

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—Willie Pep, who made ring history last night by recapturing the world featherweight championship from Sandy Saddler in a bloody battle at Madison Square Garden, probably will defend the crown in a "rubber match" with Saddler at Yankee Stadium in June.

That June meeting will be a command performance from the sell-out crowd of 19,000 fans who witnessed the great 15-round fight and from the thousands more who saw the bout on television.

Pep, displaying unexpected speed and skill, won the unanimous decision from the slender, sleepy looking young Harlem boy who had knocked out Willie in the fourth round of the first bout on Oct. 29. But on at least four occasions it seemed that 22-year-old Saddler would repeat his knockout victory.

# Trucking Firm Fined \$1000 In Crash Case

## Accused of Letting Man With Artificial Leg Operate Vehicle

An interstate motor freight company was under \$1000 fine today for allowing a physically handicapped driver to operate a truck which killed three and injured two persons in a traffic accident last March in Wormleysburg, Pa.

The Spector Motor Service, Inc., with main offices in Chicago, was fined yesterday by Federal Judge Robert C. Baltzell on charges of permitting John E. Glester, New Jersey, to operate the truck while handicapped by an artificial left leg.

The company was also charged with failure to file a physical condition report on the driver.

Sentences 3 Here

In the Wormleysburg accident, the truck is reported to have overturned, crushing five persons waiting for a bus.

In other court action, Judge Baltzell sentenced three men to federal penitentiaries for automobile thefts.

George A. Bullington, 21, Dallas, Tex., and John Henry Fritz, 19, Birmingham, Ala., were given four-year terms. Melvin Julius Overton, 23, New Albany, was sentenced to three years but was placed in five years probation.

A 25-year-old West Terre Haute resident, Charles W. Crawford, was placed on five years' probation for violation of the white slave traffic laws.

Crawford, originally sentenced in April, 1942, for taking a 13-year-old girl out of the state. Execution of the sentence had been twice delayed by Judge Baltzell.

NEW YORK, Feb. 12 (UP)—Charley Gehring, the Detroit Tigers' strong and silent second baseman of a decade ago, had one foot inside baseball's hall of fame today.

In the first ballot of the year of the Baseball Writers' Association of America, Gehring polled 102 votes—falling just 12 votes shy of the necessary 75 per cent.

Mel Ott of the New York Giants followed Gehring in the first balloting with 94 votes, five more than Al Simmons of the Philadelphia Athletics.

# Campbell Starts Serving Sentence

SHELBYVILLE, Feb. 12.—Edgar Campbell, 54-year-old Indianapolis man convicted of manslaughter yesterday in the fatal shooting of Leroy Berry, on July 25, 1942, began his prison term of two to 21 years today.

The fatal shooting took place in the rear of an apartment building at 721 N. Capitol Ave., Indianapolis, where both men lived. Campbell pleaded self-defense.

The case was venued to Shelby County Circuit Clerk on Feb. 7, after indictment of Campbell by Marion County Grand Jury. It was tried before an all-male jury.
