

Crash Kills 2 Brothers, Injures Five

Cars Collide On Icy Highway Near Walkerton

Two brothers were killed today and five other persons were injured in a two-car crash on an ice-covered highway near Walkerton, Ind.

Dead were Frank Brooks, 34, and his brother, Morris Brooks, 32, both of Kingsford Heights. Driver of the car, James W. Lipscomb, 20, of Kingsford Heights, suffered possible skull fracture. Two other passengers were slightly injured.

Frank Brooks drowned in a water-filled ditch in which he was thrown by the impact. Morris Brooks died of a fractured skull. The accident happened four miles west of Walkerton on U.S. 6.

Harvey C. Hoeffing, 36, R. R. 2, Walkerton, driver of the other car, suffered lacerations of the face and leg. A passenger, Thomas Hayakawa, Chicago, suffered a skull fracture and possible internal injuries.

Four Injured Here

The Hoeffing car collided with the car driven by Mr. Lipscomb state police said. The injured were taken to Holy Family Hospital, LaPorte.

In Indianapolis, four persons were injured, one seriously, early today when their car ploughed into a concrete safety zone marker at the southeast of New York and Illinois Sts.

The driver of the car, Buren Tygrett, 24, of 7312 Ralston Rd., was taken to General Hospital suffering from a deep cut in the back of the head and a possible skull fracture. Walter J. Dennis, St. Francis, Kas., owner of the car, received a cut over the right eye.

Policemen Injured

Two women passengers, Idel Wells, 34, R. R. 4, Box 440, and May Beatrice Cecley, 25, Rockville, suffered deep cuts about the head and bruises. They were in fair condition today in General Hospital.

Two policemen were injured slightly last night when their squad car struck a guard post in W. 16th St. just east of the White River bridge.

A run to 3420 W. 16th St. the squad car hit the post after swerving to the right to avoid an automobile stopped in its path. Patrolman Stanley McDonald was treated in General Hospital for a cut over the right eye. Patrolman B. E. Gaither suffered a bruise on the head.

During a 24-hour period, ending at 6 a.m. today, police investigated a total of 31 accidents in the city. Fourteen persons received injuries.

Youth Finds Out Why State Bans Fireworks

Twelve-year-old Larry Dunnem, 1240 Hoyt Ave., today understands why Hoosier lawmakers outlawed fireworks for Indiana.

Yesterday a friend of Larry's brought some fireworks back from a revival meeting in Kentucky and "divvied up" giving Larry a two-inch firecracker.

It was something new to Larry, whose experience didn't date back to the days when each July 4th brought lectures on how to handle fireworks.

Larry lit the fuse, tossed the cracker away. A minute later when it did not explode he decided the rain had extinguished it and picked it up to try again. At that moment the firecracker exploded, searing Larry's left hand.

He was treated at General Hospital for severe burns.

Philly Cabbies Join Walkout

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 15 (UPI)

Philadelphia's three million daily commuters were caught in a two-day travel squeeze today when taxicab drivers walked off their jobs in the fifth day of a city-wide transit tie.

Most of the 3600 drivers for the Yellow Cab Co. turned in their vehicles shortly after last midnight, leaving thousands of Philadelphians stranded in the center-city area and dependent on train service.

A company spokesman termed the walkout "unauthorized." The drivers had previously threatened to strike at midnight, but their union leaders announced a postponement until Thursday.

The two strikes left residents in the metropolitan area with only a few cabs, private automobiles, trucks and trains for transportation.
