## Caps Leading Dollar Parade To Calder Cup

Sniff Juicy Melon That's Carved Up With Championship

No one has any more affection for an extra dollar than a professional hockey player.

He skates six or seven months for his dough, socks away a goodly portion and blows the rest on Esquire-style clothes.

The Indianapolis Caps are leading the dollar-affection parade. They are sniffing the juicy cash melon that goes along with the Calder Cup championship in the American Hockey League.

They edged Buffalo, 3 to 2, here last night and widened their lead in the Western Division to five points over second-place Cleveland. In the only other game, New Haven pulled up to a tie for third in the Eastern Division by slapping down Providence, the division leader, 6 to 3.

Providence already has clinched the Eastern crown and apparently is taking it easy for the playoffs, awaiting the outcome of the race between Indianapolis, Cleveland, St. Louis and Pittsburgh. The Reds may soften up too much and be an easy mark for the Western Division champion.

The Caps leave town today for Pittsburgh where they will do battle with Hornets Saturday night and return here to face lowly Philadelphia Sunday night. Then it's hit the road again with stops in Washington next Tuesday, Buffalo next Wednesday and Cleveland, Feb. 26. Cleveland and Indianapolis are scheduled here the following night, a Sunday.

Extend Home Record

Indianapolis has lost only three of its last 12 road games, winning six and tying three.

The triumph here last night before 6734 paid customers added another notch to the record of not being beaten on home ice in the last 11 games.

The first two periods were set aside for some rough play as Officials Rabbit McVeigh and Patsy Callaghan called 12 penalties. Al Dewbury, Cap defenseman, received three of them, including five minutes in the box for fighting Right Wing Joe Levandoski in the second period. Levandoski elbowed Dewbury and the Cap defenseman returned a barrage of punches on the noggin that kept Levandoski looking for cover.

Lund Scores

Buffalo went into the lead, 1-0 at 4:32 in the first period on Floyd Curry's goal. Nelson Podolsky tied it up in the same period at 8:32 with an unassisted goal although it looked as if the puck caromed off Red Morrison's shoulder into the net.

Joe Lund, traded by Indianapolis recently to Buffalo for Kenny MacKenzie, whipped in a rebound at 9:19 in the second period for his fifth goal in two nights. Freddie Glover pulled the Caps up, however, at 15:14, jamming the puck by goalie Connie Dion in a cage-front pileup.

## Indiana Central Clinches Hoosier Conference Title

Greyhounds Trample Earlham, 78-50, With McBride, McGrath Scoring Total of 35 Points

RICHMOND, Ind., Feb. 18.—The 1949 Hoosier College Conference crown today belonged to Indiana Central's Greyhounds.

Central clinched possession here last night as they sped to victory over Earlham, 78 to 50. The Greyhounds were ahead from the starting whistle and were pulling farther away as the final gun sounded.

The Greyhounds now have a record of eight victories and a single loss in loop play and even a loss against Hanover next Tuesday will not harm their first place position.

Earlham offered little resistance to the Greyhound onslaught trailing 16 to one in the first five minutes. The Quakers were never closer than 10 points.

Foul Frequently

At the half it was 42 to 26 and as Earlham fouled profusely the margin was punched to 57 to 30 in the first six minutes of the final period.

Ben Rhodes, Earlham forward, left the game on fouls and Tom Hufnagle sat out most of the last half because of four fouls.

Woody McBride and Bill McGrath carried the load for the Greyhounds with 19 and 16 points respectively. Junior Mannies was tops for the Richmond crew with 14.

Central's season record now is 15 and 8, while Earlham has won 5 and lost 13. It was Central's 11th victory in the last 12 games.

## Expect New IU Grid Coach To Bolster Team's Line Play

Steve Sinko Joins Clyde Smith's Staff; Formerly With Donnell at Boston U.

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., Feb. 18.—You can look for a greater accent on line play next fall when Head Coach Clyde B. Smith fields his Indiana University football team.

That something new will be indoctrinated into the I. U. squad by a new man, Steve Sinko, 39, a veteran of 15 years of collegiate and pro football as a player and coach.

Announcement of Sinko's addition to the Indiana coaching faculty was made today by Athletic Director Paul J. Harrell.

Harrell said no other additions to the staff are contemplated.

Sinko comes to Bloomington as a line coach. He is leaving his old team-mate and fellow coach, Aldo (Buff) Donnell of Boston University.

One of the Best

Earl (Red) Blaik, coach of Army, lists Sinko as one of the two best young line coaches in college football today. His first choice is Sid Gilman, new head coach at the University of Cincinnati.

Sinko, a former Duquesne University tackle, will be associated with Jimmy Freeman at Indiana. Freeman is usually in charge of guard play.

Backfield coaches under Smith are Owen (Chill) Cochran and O. Don Edmonds.

Sinko, with six years of pro ball as a player with the Washington Redskins and the Los Angeles Bulldogs, is a thorough tactician. His cross blocking and blocking feints are weapons which set up many a mousetrail play.

Uses Modified T

He is well schooled in the use of the modified T employed by Coach Smith.

Sinko graduated from Duquesne in 1934 after three years of varsity ball under Elmer Layden.

In 1939 he was line coach under Donnell at Duquesne. In 1941, Donnell and Sinko teamed as head coaches of the Pittsburgh Steelers. In addition they coached Duquesne to a top place that year in collegiate competition.

In 1944, Sinko was at Iowa City as line coach of the Iowa Pre-Flight Seahawks under Head Coach Jack Meagher later of Auburn.

Sinko will report on the campus within a few weeks.

PARIS, Feb. 18 (UP)—Continental impresarios clamored today for Dick Button to make a long series of exhibitions in Europe, but the 19-year-old Englewood, N. J., boy planned to skate his second world figure skating championship back to Harvard as quickly as possible.

Button said he would give one exhibition at Paris tomorrow and another at London Monday, then head for home to complete his freshman year in college.

A picture of grace, Button bordered on the perfect as he won his second world's championship last night with a complicated series of figures in the free skating portion of the competition. He had piled up a huge lead Wednesday in the compulsory figures portion of the meet.

The crowd of 15,000 at the Palais de Sport applauded him for five full minutes after he completed his performance.

# Mar. 17 and 18 Set Tentatively for Meet Open to All Amateurs

Entries From Among Golden Gloves Contestants Especially Sought by Backer

A new sponsor for this year's Indiana Association Amateur Athletic Union Boxing Championships today announced tentative dates for the 1949 state-wide tournament.

The tourney backer, the Robison-Ragsdale Post of the American Legion, has set Mar. 17 and 18 as the tentative dates for this year's event.

The competition will follow along the same lines as the Golden Gloves tournament, which recently ended here. The tourney will be open to any amateur fighter in the state and a process of elimination will single out the champion in each weight division.

Site of the 1949 slugfest will be the Indianapolis National Guard Armory. Although many details for the tournament are still to be decided by the Legion post, work on entries will begin immediately.

Carry Entry Blanks

Representatives of the post, who will accompany the Times-Legion Golden Gloves team to Chicago for the Tournament of Champions, will be armed with entry blanks for the AAU tourney.

The blanks will be passed out to Indiana youths in Chicago with the advice to get their entry in early.

There will be no Novice Class in the competition. All amateurs will be placed in their particular weight division and all will do battle for a chance to compete nationally.

A team of eight fighters, those who finish on top of their divisions, will go to Boston, Mass., Apr. 4, 5 and 6, to battle other state champions for national honors.

Deadlines to Be Set

Weights in the tournament will be, flyweight, 112; bantamweight, 118; featherweight, 126; lightweight, 135; welterweight, 147; middleweight, 160; light heavyweight, 175; and heavyweight.

Deadlines for entries will be decided later by the Legion Post. A committee will be selected to head the program. It is the first time the Robison-Ragsdale Post has sponsored the AAU tourney.

In the 1948 AAU State Championships held in Indianapolis, youths from Evansville, Terre Haute, Gary, South Bend, Marion, Ft. Wayne, Angola, Muncie and Indianapolis competed.

Entrants must be 16 years of age to enter the tournament and have the consent of their parents if they are under 21.

The Legion especially will encourage champions and runners-up from this year's Golden Gloves Tournament to enter.

## Williams' Pilot Asks Fight Delay

Seeks Month's Rest After Gavilan Bout

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 18 (UP)—Frank (Blinky) Palermo, manager of lightweight titleholder Ike Williams, today asked that his fighter be given a month's grace between his scheduled title fight with Enrique Bolanos and his encounter with Kid Gavilan.

Palermo said he wanted to change the April 21 date of Bolanos' title bout at Los Angeles because Williams boxes Kid Gavilan in New York on March 18 "and it's sure to be a tough fight."

Palermo said, "He'll need a good rest before he can go back into training for Bolanos."

Williams' manager will fly to Los Angeles next Tuesday to arrange a new date with comedians Bud Abbott and Lou Costello, promoters of the title bout, the proceeds of which will go to charity.

## \$400,000 Offered Louis for Bout

CINCINNATI, O., Feb. 18 (UP)—Joe Louis was offered a \$400,000 guarantee today by Cincinnati promoter Sam Becker to defend his world heavyweight boxing title here this summer against the winner of the Ezzard Charles-Joe Maxim fight on Feb. 28.

They are scheduled for a 15-round bout in the new Cincinnati Gardens.

The offer was wired to Truman Gibson, Chicago attorney for Louis. Becker said he would advance Louis \$100,000 when the contract was signed.

The telegram said Louis has announced that he wanted a guarantee of \$400,000 if he fights again.

"I will guarantee Joe Louis \$400,000 with a privilege of 40 per cent of the gate, motion pictures, television, radio and whatever other concessions necessary to fight the winner of the Charles-Maxim bout here in Cincinnati," the telegram stated.

"This is a bona fide offer and I will meet you or Louis' managers immediately to close all details," it added.

The fight promoter is a Cincinnati clothing manufacturer. His hobby is boxing and he has had repeated success in promoting fights.

## Former Butler Grid Coach Dies

LONG BEACH, Cal., Feb. 18.—Harry Bell, Butler University football coach in the early thirties, died here yesterday after a brief illness. He was 80.

Bell had retired from coaching several years ago and had been a Long Beach contractor most recently. He had coached at Drake, Des Moines, Lombard College, Butler and Illinois Wesleyan. He also served briefly as assistant to Paul Schiesler with the professional Hollywood Bears.

At Butler, Bell succeeded Patsy Clark, serving two years as head football coach.
