

Safety Board Bans Parking On Circle

Johnson Proposal Limits Bus Stops To Two Places

Automobiles will not be permitted to park on the Circle and bus stops will be limited to one of two places on the Circle effective 6 a. m. Monday, the Safety Board announced today.

The proposal calling for the elimination of 20-minute parking in front of H. P. Wasson & Co. and the Columbia Club during the demolition and construction work in the English Hotel block, was presented today by Lewis (Cap) Johnson, city traffic engineer.

Under the new regulation, approximately 42 buses an hour will stop in front of Wasson's and 43 in front of the Circle Theater. All buses will be limited to one stop on the Circle.

Buses stopping in front of Wasson's will include Central Ave., Meridian St., Golden Hill and Miller's Road.

Those halting in front of the Circle Theater will include Beech Grove-Keystone Ave.; Beech Grove-Sherman Drive; Beech Grove-Raymond St.; Lexington-Emerson Ave.; Shelby St.; English Ave.; Madison Ave., and Sunshine Gardens.

Beech Grove-Keystone, Beech Grove-Sherman Drive and Lexington-Emerson Ave. buses will be rerouted to approach the Circle north on Meridian, turn east on Market St., without circling the Monument, turn south on Delaware and proceed southeast on Virginia Ave.

VA Warns Trainees To Report Earnings

Veterans taking institutional on-farm training under the GI Bill who wish to continue receiving subsistence allowance must report their 1948 earnings by Tuesday.

More than 5500 Hoosier veterans taking on-farm training have been asked to report last year's income from productive labor only to each regional office. The reports will be used to adjust each veteran's subsistence for 1949.

House Defeats Freer Liquor Bill

One Liberal Measure Killed in 30-44 Vote

State representatives today defeated two bills which would have liberalized the Indiana liquor laws.

One proposed the granting of licenses to veterans clubs which are located within 200 feet of churches or schools but which have been established more than three years. This measure was defeated 30 to 44.

Rep. Jess Andrew spoke for defeat of the bill. He said there was no need to sell liquor within 200 feet of churches or schools.

Cites Columbia Club

Rep. Wilbur Baldwin (D. New Harmony) demanded, "Then why don't you take your Republican Columbia Club away from the church on the Circle?"

Rep. Baldwin was author of the bill.

The other measure would have permitted the sale of beer in 6 or 7-ounce containers. It was defeated 37 to 46.

Pastor and Wife To Travel Abroad

Dr. and Mrs. John B. Ferguson of Indianapolis will visit relatives in Australia the coming autumn and also spend some time in the Philippines.

Dr. Ferguson becomes pastor emeritus of the Irvington Presbyterian Church July 1. He recently resigned as the minister and will be succeeded in May as active pastor by Dr. Howard W. Stone of Franklin, Ind.

Dr. Ferguson is a one time missionary to the Philippines. Mrs. Ferguson was born in China and lived there until she was 14. They will continue to maintain their home at 312 N. Ritter Ave. while traveling abroad.

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Dr. H. W. Stone To Take Local Pulpit, May 1

Franklin Minister To Become Pastor Of Irvington Church

Dr. Howard W. Stone of Franklin, Ind., will assume his duties as the new pastor of the Irvington Presbyterian Church, May 1.

Dr. Stone's acceptance of the Irvington pulpit has not been received by the church, as yet. Dr. John B. Ferguson, the retiring pastor, said. But it was announced last night in the Franklin Star as released by Dr. Stone.

The new, 40-year-old Indianapolis pastor is 6 feet, 5 inches tall and weighs 250 lbs. He played varsity football four years at Jamestown College in North Dakota. He counts Dr. Alexander E. Sharp, Dr. Ferguson, Dr. George Arthur Frantz and the Rev. Roy B. Connor Jr., among his warmest friends here.

Dr. Frantz, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, and the Rev. Mr. Connor, pastor of the Meridian Heights Presbyterian Church, both are alumni of Dr. Stone's alma mater, Western Theological Seminary, Pittsburgh.

Dr. Sharp, executive secretary of the Indiana Synod, last week accepted the position of administrative secretary of the Presbyterian Board of National Missions, New York.

Won Fellowship

The Western Seminary awarded Dr. Stone a fellowship for study at Cambridge University but the war came along and he enlisted as a chaplain and served two years instead. He likes to fish but says he is not an "outstanding fisherman."

The Presbyterian Church at Franklin has been Dr. Stone's only pastorate since he was graduated from theological school seminary in 1937. He was born in Canada, grew up in the northwestern United States, is synodical chairman of the Presbyterian New Life Movement and Presbyterian life chairman of the ministerial relations committee. Last year, he was Indianapolis Presbytery moderator.

He and Mrs. Stone have two children, 1-year-old Katharine and Robert (Bobby), who is 9. The mother, the former Margaret Mitchell, did not write "Gone With the Wind," her husband explained. Mrs. Stone was born in South Dakota and went to school and college with her husband.

The Irvington Church, one of the largest Protestant congregations in Indianapolis, includes about 1550 members. The Franklin Church from which the new pastor comes has an enrollment about half of that. He with his family will live in the manse, recently purchased by the church, at 776 N. Audubon Rd.

Senate GOP Plans Bonus Bill Parley

Fail to Reach Decision Today

Senate Republicans plan to meet tomorrow for a discussion of the soldiers' bonus bill after an unsuccessful attempt to reach a decision today.

Sen. William Bates, chairman of the Senate Military and Veterans Affairs Committee, was reported favoring substitution of the Republican payment plan for the Democrat plan.

The Democrat bonus bill, to be financed by a one-fourth of 1 per cent increase in the gross income tax, passed the House last week. Since then it has been held in the Senate committee.

It calls for a \$400 maximum payment and a \$30 minimum based on \$10 for each month of domestic and \$15 for each month of foreign service.

Republicans in the Senate passed a bonus bill earlier in the session which calls for slightly higher payments. It is being held by the House Military and Veterans Affairs Committee.

House Unit Backs Schricker Budget

Bill Due to Reach Floor Tomorrow

The House Ways and Means Committee "A" today recommended passage of Gov. Schricker's record budget.

The measure will probably be called down onto the floor tomorrow for discussion and possible amendments and then called down again the next day for passage.

At the last minute Gov. Schricker cut \$1.2 million from the proposed increase of \$1.8 which a "generous" Ways and Means Committee had decided to grant three state colleges.

State yesterday the committee agreed to give Purdue University \$1.4 million more than was recommended for it by the Budget Committee.

The committee, at the same time, voted to recommend an additional \$200,000 for the next two years for both Indiana State Teachers College and Ball State Teachers College.

Cut by Governor

The Purdue increase was reduced by the Governor to \$400,000 and the additional amount for the other two schools was cut in half.

This would bring the general fund budget for the next two years to approximately \$207 million. No reductions were made in the items calling for an additional \$25 million outlay for building and repair.

New hikes in the state's support of local schools indicated the fixed bill for education and welfare would mount well above the \$77 million already required by law to be spent.

The total spending outlook mounted with the newest additions to approximately \$309 million for the coming biennium.
