Peace Officer**Services Sunday For Glider Pilot****R. M. Hutchinson, Killed in Philippines**

CAMBRIDGE CITY, Mar. 2—Flight Officer Robert Milton Hutchinson, glider commander, who died on Independence Day, 1945, in the Philippines when his plane crashed, after dropping a message to troops under fire, will be buried Sunday in East Hill Cemetery, Arlington, Ind. with full military honors.

The final graveside guard of honor will be furnished by the Lawrence H. Bertsch Post No. 169, American Legion.

The Rev. R. C. Buck of Arlington and the Rev. Frank Smith, pastor of the Cambridge City Christian Church will officiate in services at 1 p. m. Sunday in the Howard Funeral Home, here, preceding the graveside rites.

F.O. Hutchinson, who was 24, was born in Arlington. He was graduated from Lincoln High School here where he won his letter on the track team. He attended Boy's State and was a member of the Christian Church.

F.O. Hutchinson enlisted in the Glider Corps of the Army Air Force in June, 1942, after studying aeronautical engineering for two years at Purdue University. He was commissioned as a flight officer in February, 1943.

Becomes A Pilot

Following participation in the invasion of Leyte with the 3d Air Commando Group of the 5th Air Force he became a liaison pilot and commanded an advanced detachment of light unarmored liaison planes evacuating wounded, directing dive bombers, adjusting artillery fire and dropping supplies and carrying messages.

At the time of his death, F.O. Hutchinson had flown over 100 hours in combat and had been awarded the Air Medal, two unit citations and five battle stars.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ross M. Hutchinson, Cambridge City; grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Hutchinson, Arlington; a grandmother, Mrs. Margaret Wright; three brothers, Richard E., Rupert L. and Joseph W. Hutchinson, and three sisters, Mrs. Margaret Garner, Miss Martha and Miss Anne Hutchinson.

Arthur Young

Services and burial for Arthur Young, violin teacher and former Indianapolis musician, who died Monday in Elkhart, will be held tomorrow in Elkhart. He was 67.

Mr. Young was a resident of Indianapolis 52 years and a lifetime member of Local 3, Indianapolis Musicians Union. He was employed for the last several years by the Leedy Drum Manufacturing Co., Elkhart.

Mr. Young played in the Circle Theater orchestra for 15 years.

Survivors include his wife, Inez Myrl; a son, Carl Young, Santa Monica, Cal.; a sister, Mrs. Carrie Gross, Chula Vista, Cal., and two brothers, Richard H. and John Young, Indianapolis.

Thirty-five leading citizens, chosen for their ability and knowledge, spent 18 months, traveling at their own expense, in studying the auto tax situation in Indiana. They made a complete, detailed report. Based upon this report, House Bill 471 was drawn up and presented to the Legislature.
