Mrs. Edna Barcus Dead Here at 73

Active in Legion Auxiliary Circles

Services for Mrs. Edna Mae Barcus, who died yesterday in her home, 711 N. DeQuincy St., will be led by the Rev. A. C. Brooks of the Third Christian Church at 1:30 p. m. tomorrow in Shirley Brothers Central Chapel. Burial will be in Crown Hill. She was 73.

Mrs. Barcus was organizer and president emerita of the American Legion Auxiliary in Indiana, and a past vice president of the national organization. Known by thousands as "Mother Barcus," she was born in Shelby County. She lived in Indianapolis 50 years.

Mrs. Barcus became the first president of the Legion Auxiliary in Indiana at its formation in 1920. She was vice president of the national organization in 1924-1925. She also served two years as secretary-nationale of the S. & A. O. U. M. W. and fellowship organization of the auxiliary.

War Worker

Actively working during both wars, she was a member of the Rainbow Chord Society in World War I, which sold war savings stamps and mothered the Rainbow Division. Her son was in this division.

She was a member of the Red Cross during World War II. She also was a member of the Gold Star Mothers of World War I. Mrs. Barcus was president four years of the auxiliary of Haywood Barcus Post 55, American Legion, co-named in honor of her son, Earl R. Barcus, killed during World War I.

Scholarship Fund

The Legion Auxiliary established a scholarship loan fund in her honor in 1932 and 1948, which together have benefited 51 students. She was a member of Third Christian Church, Marion County, 126 S. & 40th, and the New Century Club. She also was an honorary member of the Mayflower Society.

Surviving are two brothers, Ernest Burkhardt, New Palestine, and Jesse Burkhardt, Veterans' Hospital, West Los Angeles.

Past departmental presidents of the American Legion Auxiliary and all posts and auxiliary members of Haywood-Barcus Post will be honorary pallbearers.

Senate Defeats Withholding Tax

A bill for withholding gross income tax payments by employers failed to receive the required majority for passage in a final vote in the Senate today.

The bill which had been approved by the House earlier in the session received a vote of 25 ayes and 24 noes in the Senate. Twenty-six votes are necessary for passage.

Under provisions of the bill, employers would be required to withhold the gross income tax from salary, wage and commission checks of employees.

It may be called down for another vote after today.

Bloomington Milk Drops to 17 Cents

BLOOMINGTON, Mar. 3—Retail milk prices dropped one cent per quart here today. All local processing plants announced a price drop to 17 cents.

Simultaneously, the city's one-out-of-town dairy, Colliers of Martinsville and Spencer, dropped their price to 16 cents. Harry Long, manager of the Spencer branch, said his product will continue to sell exactly one cent under local prices as long as one Bloomington dairy remains in its territory.

Vernon Huffman, spokesman for Johnson Creamery, a local plant, denied any price war against outside competition. He said, however, that a cut to producers of 30 cents per hundredweight announced yesterday was precipitated somewhat by the Collier competition.

The World Prayer Day services have been arranged by the Indianapolis Council of Churchwomen in co-operation with women in 74 countries. Dr. C. W. Connor, Jr., pastor of the Meridian Heights Presbyterian Church, will speak at night.

Smaller meetings will be held in all parts of the city to mark the day. Mrs. Dorsey D. King is the churchwomen's council president.

Killed on Bombing Mission Over Europe

Military graveside rites for S-Sgt. Robert L. Zahn, 2111 Napoleon St., will be held Saturday following the 1:30 p. m. services at J. C. Wilson Chapel of the Chimes. Burial will be in Memorial Park Cemetery.

Sgt. Zahn, who was 19, was killed on his 13th mission over Germany. He died Feb. 25, 1944.

Before enlisting, Mr. Zahn was employed at Methodist Hospital. He was a native of Indianapolis and attended Warren Central and Manual High School.

While in the service, he was assigned to the 301st Bomb Group, 10th Air Force, which was based in Foggia, Italy.

Surviving are his mother, Mrs. Alice Duncan; his father, Curtis Zahn; a sister, Mrs. Grace Hughes; three brothers, Norman, Roy and Jimmie Zahn; his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Lillie Vornheim, and his paternal grandfather, Edwin Zahn, all of Indianapolis.
