Radio Moscow Baits U. S. In Smooth American Accent

Efficient Announcer Says in 15 Minutes
What Vishinsky Needed Hours to RelateBy NAT BARROWS, Times Foreign Correspondent.
LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Mar. 18.—The old fire-breathing hatchet man, Andrei Vishinsky, never produced any more vitriolic pack of lies and half-truths than the propaganda that Radio Moscow is pouring out these days.

That program, beamed westward in English over the 25-meter band, is symptomatic of the intensity with which the Soviets are trying to undermine and wreck the Marshall Plan and the Atlantic Defense Pact.

and to understand the motives behind these furious attacks.

Radio Moscow, as part of the infiltration tactics of communist aims for world domination, is repeating—over and over the same old abuse that Mr. Vishinsky so often has unleashed in United Nations sessions.

But the smooth, efficient announcer in Moscow, speaking with an American accent, wraps up in a 15-minute package the charges that have occupied Mr. Vishinsky here for hours.

The standard Molotov-Vishinsky theme of western warmon-

gering is played up and down the scale. Radio Moscow doesn't say simply "The United States." It's "the warmongering United States" and "the Anglo-American warmongers."

I would gather, listening to Radio Moscow, that the U. S. S. R. won the war entirely by itself . . . that only the "people's democracies" enjoy the good life and free government . . . that Congress is occupied solely with "an armament drive."
