Radio Moscow Bait U. S. In Smooth American Accent

Efficient Announcer Says in 15 Minutes What Vishinsky Needed Hours to Relate

That program, beamed westward in English over the 25-meter band, is symptomatic of the intensity with which the Soviets are trying to undermine and wreck the Marshall Plan and the Atlantic Defense Pact.
