**Group En Route From Western Europe**

Fourteen Indianapolis residents are among the 106 Indiana servicemen whose bodies returned to the United States aboard the United States Army Transport Haiti Victory, the Department of the Army announced today.

A total of 2918 armed forces dead originally buried in military cemeteries in Northern France, Holland and Luxembourg, is being returned aboard the transport.

Each next of kin of the servicemen will be notified in advance of the arrival of the vessel and again after the arrival of the bodies at the regional distribution centers of the American Graves Registration Service.

## Study Animals in Arctic Cold Navy Seeks Clue For Service Garb

PASADENA, Cal., Mar. 18 (UP)—Alaska may be a battle ground if another war comes and science is seeking to learn a secret from the Arctic animals.

The secret is: How do the animals stand the extreme cold?

The Navy has given a contract to the California Institute of Technology to investigate the blood chemistry of Arctic animals. Out of the study, the Navy hopes, may come some answers to how soldiers can live in the Arctic.

One CAL Tech scientist assigned to the job is Dr. Dan H. Campbell, a chemist, who already has made one trip to the Arctic and is preparing another for late in the summer.

He wants to learn how birds with their thin insulation can stand sub-zero weather. He also wants to study the blood chemistry of hibernating animals.

A recent report from Alaska said that the caribou, for instance, has little fat under the hide covering his legs. The answer could be, according to Dr. Campbell, that there may be a type of tissue in or under the skin that gives the animal super insulation against cold.

## Report Mindszenty Lives in Clean Room

BUDAPEST, Mar. 18 (UP)—Joseph Cardinal Mindszenty, Hungarian prelate who was sentenced to life imprisonment on treason and other charges, is in good health and living in a "clean, well-heated furnished room," a government source said today.

The source emphasized that the Roman Catholic prelate was not serving his sentence in a prison cell. But he did not disclose location of the room, except to say that it was in Budapest.

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**Stravinsky Refuses To Greet Shostakovich**

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 18 (UP)—Classical composer Igor Stravinsky refused today to join other American musicians in welcoming Soviet composer Dimitri Shostakovich on his forthcoming visit to the United States.

Mr. Stravinsky said music critic Olin Downes of the New York Times invited him to "join with other outstanding American musicians" in sending a message of greeting to Mr. Shostakovich.

"Regret not to be able to join welcome of Soviet artists coming to this country," the Russian-born Stravinsky wired in reply "But all my esthetic convictions oppose such gesture."
