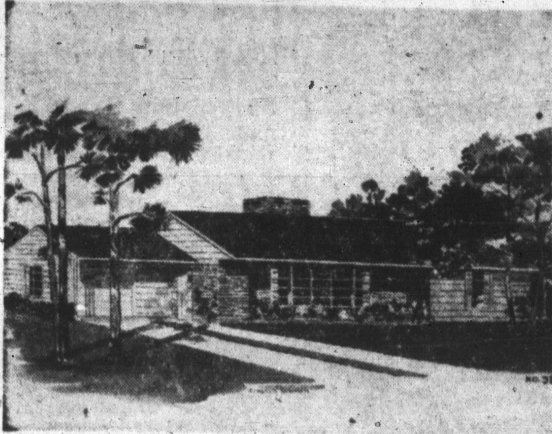


Small Homes—

Ranch Type Home Proves Popular and Economical

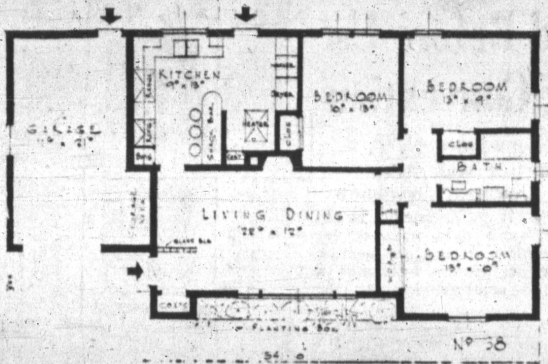


THIS LITTLE ranch type home is proving to be exceedingly popular wherever shown. It provides the maximum amount of living area in just about the minimum amount of space. Without the garage the house is only 42' 6" x 28' 8" and yet it contains three large bedrooms, a combination kitchen and utility room, and a large living-dining area.

The architect has designed the exterior of the house to be built of rough cedar shingles combined with ledge rock, but the house would be equally attractive with a combination of cedar shingles or horizontal wood siding and brick veneer. The house is oblong in shape which makes it economical to build. The wide picture window in front with a flower box underneath is another feature making this house look much more pretentious than it really is.

The roof extends out over the front door, providing a sheltered entrance from the garage and into the open planned vestibule. To the right is a coat closet, and to the left a tier of glass blocks may be erected part way up from the floor to eliminate cold drafts blowing around this area. The living and dining room are combined, and there is a natural fireplace along one side. This arrangement makes possible a cozy placement of furniture around the fireplace in the winter, and this could be reversed for a pleasant view in front of the picture window in the summer time.

TO THE left of this area is an exceptionally well designed kitchen and utility room. There is a large picture window over



where the heater is shown in the plan above.

There are three large bedrooms—two with cross ventilation and one with a double picture window in one end. You will note that all the closets are of the wardrobe type and employ sliding doors. This makes the bedrooms appear much larger than they really are as the space usually occupied by the swing of a hinged door is eliminated.

The bath is located between the two larger bedrooms and is only a few steps from the living-dining area, making it not only convenient for members of the family, but for guests as well.

Large Pillow Once Sign Of Rank

STANDARD PATTERN GROUP (Senior Division): 1. Dress—Cotton, made from standard pattern. 2. Dress—Silk, rayon, wool, etc., made from standard pattern. 3. Coat or suit made from standard pattern.

STANDARD PATTERN GROUP (Junior Division, contestants 18 years of age or below): 1. Dress—Any material, made from standard pattern. 2. Coat or suit made from standard pattern.

GLAMOUR GROUP (Contestants of all ages)—"Special occasion" clothes such as evening dresses, lounge clothes or beach wear, made from standard pattern or from original design by contestant.

ORIGINAL DESIGN GROUP (Contestants of all ages)—Adults dresses, coats or suits originally designed by the contestant WITHOUT use of commercial patterns.

CHILDREN'S GROUP (Contestants of all ages)—Garments for children up to 12 years of age, made from standard pattern or originally designed by contestant. All garments for children—even though of original design—must be entered in this group.

Local prizes in each of the classifications are \$50, first; \$20, second. First place winners in the national judging will receive \$100 awards. In addition, if any Times' winners place first in national judging, they will receive additional \$100 awards from The Times.

Also, the first place winners in the national judging are invited to New York to see their garments worn by professional models in a National Style Show in the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel. While there, they stop at the Waldorf.

Let's Eat—Kitchen Life Marks Ties Of Family

Women Of Old Knew The Answer

I HAVE about concluded that we food editors have gone too far in bellyhooping time-saving recipes and jiffy dishes so the home-maker can stay out of the kitchen most of the time.

The strongest tie that binds the family group together is a dependence on each other. Women who have for generations prepared from scratch the finest of food have earned the distinction of being the best cooks ever in the minds of the family.

And those women have won something that is most gratifying to the feminine heart. The test on this food business ought to answer the question "are we headed toward weakening or strengthening the family circle?"

DE LUXE CRUMB COFFEE CAKE

2 c. all-purpose flour
1/2 tsp. soda
1 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1 c. sugar
1/2 tsp. ginger
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1/2 tsp. nutmeg
1/2 c. butter or margarine
1 egg
1/2 c. buttermilk
1/2 c. raisins, moist
1 c. chopped pecans

Sift flour, measure and sift twice with the baking powder, soda, sugar, salt and spices. Cut butter into this mixture with a pastry blender or with two knives. Remove cup of this crumbly mixture. Stir in raisins and nuts in the rest of the mixture. Beat egg, stir in buttermilk, and add all at once and stir vigorously until all the dry mixture is dampened, then add two or three extra stirs.

Have a 9-inch square or round cake pan well buttered. Sprinkle half crumbs in bottom, then turn in batter and quickly spread out evenly. Then sprinkle top with rest of crumbs. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees F.) for about 30 minutes or until well browned and done through. Serve warm.
