The 20-year-old housewife and all-around sportswoman, who claims the kite-flying champion ship with a 23½-hour endurance record, said she will now concentrate on ice skating until the weather gets better and she can try again to break her own mark.

SHE STARTED her second attempt at 1 p. m. yesterday, but the brisk wind on Columbus' hill-top section along with a heavy snowfall was just too much for the near-mile of string attached to the kite.
