

GOP Coalition Groups To Map Ingles Ouster Moves Here Tonight

Three Factions to Frame Petitions To Fire Chairman From County Post.

The coalition of three Republican party factions will convene tonight to complete plans for their move to oust James W. Ingles from the GOP county chairmanship.

Ouster petitions to be signed by a majority of the precinct committeemen were to be drawn up tonight for distribution to all the party workers tomorrow and Friday.

The petitions, which signed, will be presented to the Indiana Republican Committee which, under the law, has the power to remove a county chairman for cause.

A formal demand for Chairman Ingles' removal was made to the state committee last Saturday. The demand contained a series of charges against Chairman Ingles' management of the party's campaign last fall.

Leaders of the ouster group predicted that 14 of the 22 members of the state committee will vote to remove Mr. Ingles.

Meanwhile, three more of Chairman Ingles' ward chairmen resigned last night, bringing the total resignations to seven since the three factions agreed on the ouster move last week.

The ward chairmen who resigned last night were Carl Wiking of the 24th ward; Joe Shinn of the 11th ward and Roscoe J. Wittman of the 19th ward.

Others Resigned

Other chairmen who resigned last week were Samuel Blum, of the 12th ward; Edwin McClure, Washington Township; John Goodnight, 7th ward; and Jack Ennis, Franklin Township.

The three factions working together in the ouster move include Republicans United, headed by Eugene Fife Jr., United Republican Precinct Committeemen Association and the Republican Veterans of World War II.

Support Ennis

Leaders in these three groups agreed to support Mr. Ennis for the chairmanship.

Joe Rand Beckett, chairman of the newly formed Republican Citizens Advisory Committee, appointed by Chairman Ingles to draft a party program, said yesterday that his committee would not be affected by any change in the party chairmanship.

"We will continue to carry on this work regardless of who is chairman," he said.

Hoosier Beauty, Baby Are 'All Right,' Sheriff Told

Disappearance Still Clouded by Mystery

NORTH JUDSON, Mar. 23—The disappearance of a former high school beauty queen and her 18-month-old daughter was still shrouded in mystery today, although authorities have been informed both are safe.

Mrs. Blanche Leckman told Sheriff Jesse Werner that her daughter, Mrs. Betty Teallow, 21, and her baby girl, Judy, were "all right."

She declined to give their whereabouts, however, and the sheriff continued working on the case.

The young mother, who was crowned queen of the Northern Indiana Muck Crops show several years ago, and her daughter had been reported missing since last Saturday night.

The young woman's husband, Marshall, who operates a general store with his father near here, reported the matter to authorities on Sunday after searching for them 24 hours.

Yesterday Sheriff Werner expressed fear that the mother and daughter had met with foul play.

The car which Mrs. Teallow was driving when last seen, has been found at Kewanna, about 30 miles southeast of here. It was undamaged.

She said Capt. Latta-Lawrence was told her that their marriage was a "cause of great misery and suffering to Congresswoman Edith Nourse Rogers with whom the defendant told the plaintiff he had been on close and intimate terms for 20 years."

Nevertheless, she said, she returned with her husband to his apartment in the Shoreham Hotel. Mrs. Rogers also has an apartment in the hotel. In the subsequent months, she said, her happiness depended upon the presence or absence of the Congresswoman.

Left 'Late in Night'

If Mrs. Rogers were in town, she said, her husband treated her cruelly, refusing to "cohabit" with her and leaving her to visit the Congresswoman's suite "late into the night."

Finally, Mrs. Latta-Lawrence said, her husband forced her to take her belongings out of his apartment. She stayed at the hotel, however, fooling her own wife until July 26. On Aug. 6, she said, she returned to her Los Angeles home, intending to return to Washington on Sept. 15.
