County Traffic Toll Rises to 12, Syracuse Pedestrian, 69, Killed

Southport Teacher's Wife, Truck Driver Die in Accidents Here

The 1948 death toll from accidents in Marion County stood at 12 today as two more fatalities were recorded, one a truck driver and the other the wife of a baseball coach.

The victims died in separate accidents yesterday as another death was reported from Syracuse, Ind., by state police and two persons were injured in other city accidents.

Robert Leon Brown, 27, of 7501 E. Washington St., was killed about 3:30 p. m. when the petro-

leum panel truck he was driving skidded and crashed into a tree.

The other county fatality was Mrs. Mary Hannah Linson, 32, of 1839 Thompson Rd., wife of Ray Linson, teacher and baseball coach at Southport High School, and mother of three.

Deputy sheriff said she was killed instantly when her car struck by an outboard Pennsylvania Railroad passenger train on Stop 10 Rd., east of State Rd. 431, about 1:45 p. m.

From Syracuse, state police reported the death of William A. Rapp, 69, of Syracuse. He was killed about 7 p. m. while walking along Rd. 13 when struck by a truck driven by an Indianapolis man, Russell Arnett, 438 Villa Ave.

Mr. Arnett told officers he did not see Mr. Rapp and a companion, W. L. Swarth, until it was too late to avoid hitting him. Death was reported due to a crushed chest and fractured skull.

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Dead when police arrived, Mr. Brown had been thrown to the right side of the car seat. He died of a broken neck, according to the coroner's office.

The automobile in which Mrs. Linson died yesterday was thrown 75 feet from the crossing and tossed onto the railroad embankment. Her body was thrown out of the wreckage against a wire fence.

Observers told police Mrs. Linson's car had been parked just west of the crossing for about 45 minutes before the accident and started forward just before the train reached the road. View of the crossing is unobscured.

The Linsons' three children are William, 6; Karen, 4; and Jeffrey, 2.

Services for Mrs. Linson will be held at 10 a. m. Monday in the J. C. Wilson Chapel of the Chimes. Burial will be in Crown Hill.

She was a member of the American Association of University Women, Pi Zeta Sorority and the Second Presbyterian Church.

Pedestrian Hurt
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near her home by a car driven by George R. Copeland, 24, of R. R. 10, Box 550.

Police arrested Copeland and charged him with reckless driving and vagrancy. The injured woman was taken to Methodist Hospital where she was treated and released.

Arthur Risley, 24, of Plainville, was taken to Veterans Hospital on Cold Springs Road with a cut over his left eye and possible shoulder injuries after the automobile he was driving hit a supporting pillar at the railroad underpass, 800 Madison Ave., police said.

Pickets Ring Carnegie Hall At World Peace Meeting

'Cold War' Battleground Closely Guarded; Immigration Agents Nab 3 Delegates

NEW YORK, Mar. 26 (UP)—The keynote session of the Cultural and Scientific Conference for World Peace opened today in Carnegie Hall without three Canadian delegates who were picked up by immigration officers.

A well-dressed audience passed through a slim line of pickets who chanted: "Throw the bums out."

The hall was crowded for the opening session. About 50 pickets walked in a circle outside but the number was expected to swell to hundreds later in the day. Nearly 100 police who patrolled the area which for today was the cold war's hottest ideological battleground.

Seats Filled Rapidly
The 3000 seats at historic Carnegie Hall filled rapidly with a young audience, many of whom arrived in taxicabs.

The conference opened last night with a \$10-a-plate roast turkey banquet. During the dinner the Canadian delegates were picked up quietly by immigration authorities and taken to headquarters for questioning on the legality of their entrance into the country.

Catholic war veterans in uniform outside the main entrance of Carnegie Hall shouted "Go into that hell hole."

The picket line included six girls in native Croatian costume carrying a large drawing of Josef Cardinal Mindszenty looking out through prison bars.

In the audience in the hall was Gerhard Eisler, once described as the No. 1 Communist in the United States. Yesterday at the trial of 11 U. S. Communist leaders Louis Budenz, former managing editor of the Communist Daily Worker, testified that Eisler had supported the view that only the Red army could bring the United States to socialism.

Urges United Front
At the opening session, former Assistant Attorney General O. John Rogge called for "a united front of all peace-minded people" to join in "a gigantic effort to stop this nation's drive toward war."

The Canadian delegates who were picked up last night were Barker Fairley, vice president of the Canadian Council of American-Soviet Friendship; his wife, Margaret, and John Goss, director of the John Goss Studio Theater in British Columbia.

Albert L. Maillard, president of the Electric League of Indianapolis, sponsor of the exposition, estimated 35,000 persons will have attended the show by closing time tonight.

Couple Killed in Fire
LAWRENCE, Mass., Mar. 26 (UP)—Trapped in their attic apartment, an elderly man and his invalid wife were killed early today in a two-alarm fire. The body of George M. Hackett, 85, retired contractor, was found on the kitchen floor near a portable oil burner which he apparently had accidentally upset. The body of his crippled wife, Mary, 82, lay on a bed.

Slated for Quiet Military Roles

Bedell Smith, Leahy Resign Top Posts

WASHINGTON, Mar. 26 (UP)—Fleet Adm. William D. Leahy and Lt. Gen. Walter Bedell Smith, two of the nation's top military leaders in World War II, were slated today for quieter roles in the nation's service.

President Truman has announced the resignations of Adm. Leahy as his personal chief of staff and of Gen. Smith as U. S. Ambassador to Russia.

Speculation over filling of the vacant posts was widely varied, however. Observers said that:

ONE: That Adm. Leahy's war-born post of chief of staff to the President is no longer needed and that it will remain vacant unless a new war emergency arises.

TWO: The era of assigning military men to ambassadorial posts is past, indicating that a career diplomat will succeed Gen. Smith at the Moscow embassy.

Envoy to France
During the war, Adm. Leahy served as U. S. Ambassador to Vichy France before becoming the late President Roosevelt's personal chief of staff in 1942.

Gen. Smith, before going to Moscow, was chief of staff to Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower during the North African, Italian and European campaigns.

Neither man will return to civilian life.

Gen. Smith will get a new assignment from the Army, probably command of the first Army at Governor's Island, N. Y.

Adm. Leahy, as one of the nation's four five-star admirals, holds that rank for life.
