Cats at Retail Is Grocery Sideline

West Side Storekeeper's Former Dislike For Felines Turns Into Brisk Business

From the street, the little house at 742 W. 11th St. looks like just another neighborhood grocery.

But to cat lovers "in the know" it's the home of one of the busiest cat breeders in Indiana.

The proprietress, Mrs. D. P. Rector, has been in the cat raising business for 25 years. She and her husband consider the brisk trade they do in their front-room grocery as "just a sideline."

More than a score of felines live in Mrs. Rector's attic today. At high-birth-rate periods the population shoots up to 50. And one of the surest signs of summer each year is the day when the cats are released into the complicated system of wire-

enclosed runways that convert the Rectors' back yard into a three-ring circus for cats during warm weather.

"I can't put them outdoors a bit too early in the spring," Mrs. Rector explains. "They'd catch cold in a minute."

A native of Logansport, Mrs. Rector came to Indianapolis as a bride more than a half century ago. Her original ambition, to be a school teacher, was squelched by fast talking on Mrs. Rector's part.

How did the cattery get its start?

"WHEN I was a young girl," the breeder recalls, "I hated cats. Used to swear I'd never have one in the house."

"After I was married I learned that my husband attracted cats like a magnet. He'd bring home strays—a new one almost every night. Our grocery ran close to the

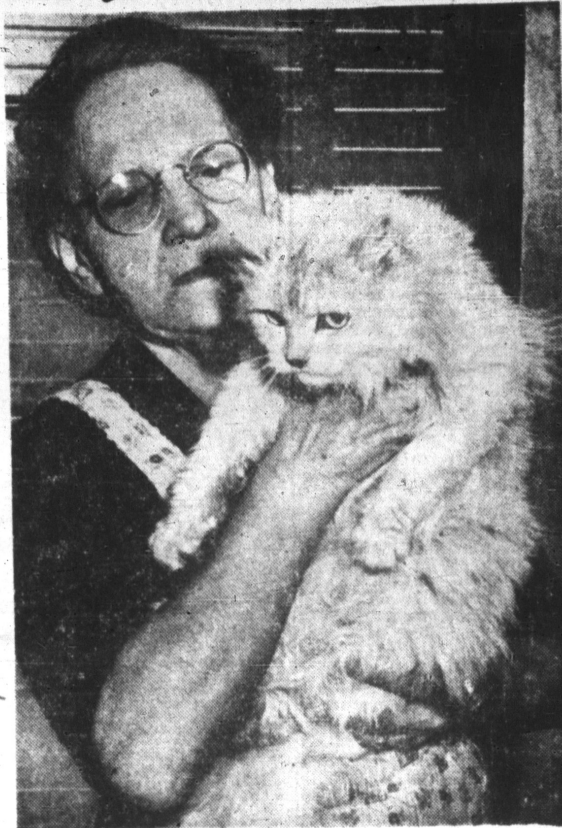
red, what with the liver he sneaked out to feed the cats. And I went wild trying to give them away."

After a while, Mrs. Rector gave up the fight.

"If I have a cat around here," she told her husband, "they're going to be good cats."

THAT WAS 25 years ago. Since then, Mrs. Rector's chinchillas, blacks and Persians have won enough show ribbons to fill a good-sized box. She raises Siamese and Manx cats, too, and her animals have attracted customers from Long Island, N. Y., St. Louis, Mo., and Kansas City, Mo., as well as from all parts of Indiana.

One of the early members of the Indianapolis Cat Club, Mrs. Rector has served as president of the society for almost 10 years.
