Hope to Wipe Out Los Angeles Smog

Index Predicts Time Fumes Will Strike

SAN FRANCISCO, Apr. 1—Smogs that give residents of Los Angeles eye irritations 10 to 20 times a year may be conquered, thanks to a new "smog index."

The index for predicting when the smog will strike was described to the American Chemical Society here by Paul L. Magill of the Stanford Research Institute.

By keeping potentially dangerous substances out of the air when smog is forecast, it may be possible to avoid the periodic eye irritation in Los Angeles, he explained.

85 Per Cent Affected

This unique smog lasts up to four hours and usually comes in the late morning in summer or fall. At least 85 per cent of the people in the area notice smog effects, usually eye irritation.

An air lid over the Los Angeles basin is to blame for the smog. The city is ringed about by high mountains and has a sort of lid of air which sometimes traps smoke and fumes for several days. When the air is pushed groundward, with its accumulated pollution, the sore eyes result.

Mr. Magill explained that the Los Angeles smog studies have included use of a smog chamber and weather records.

Big chemical mystery, still unsolved, is just what the ingredients of the eye-irritating smog are. One clue, Mr. Magill reported, is that fine oil droplets in the air seem to enhance the irritating power of other materials.
