Museum Sells Junior Books

The Children's Museum, 3010 N. Meridian St., is assuming the look of a bookstore these days. Inexpensive but authentic literature for children is sold at a sales desk which youthful shoppers are enthusiastically patronizing.

The popularly written publications relate to school subjects, helpful to children and teachers. They are issued by many of the large museums in the country, including the Children's Museum of Natural History, the American Museum of Natural History and the Encyclopedia Britannica.

There also is a line of small metal dinosaurs, various educational games and jigsaw puzzles and packets of common shells, chipped arrowheads and surplus mineral specimens from museum collections.

According to Mrs. Grace Golden, museum director, the profits from the sale of the material hardly repay the time consumed, but she feels it is a service to the community. "Nature appeals to children; they are born collectors. But to the average urban child of today it is almost a closed subject."

Members of one of the museum nature clubs sort and assemble the shells, a lesson in itself. The packets contain 15 specimens.

DISHING the DIRT

Q.—I have double yellow Easter flowers six years old. The buds form and are extra large, but when it's time for them to bloom they turn brown and soft though the plant is nice and green. Thanks for any advice.

A.—These double narcissus seem especially subject to blighting of buds. Possible explanations are too warm weather at blooming time, too little moisture in ground, and too little lime. Try (1) keeping bed well watered before and during blooming period. (2) Move one or two bulbs this summer (July) into a bed where you have mixed some agricultural lime at the rate of 1 lb. to 25 sq. ft. (3) Is it possible that your flowers are on the south side of the house where extra heat is reflected onto them?
