The Indianapolis Council of Churchwomen will stress the importance of family life at both the morning and afternoon sessions of its all-day meeting Friday beginning at 9:45 a. m.

The 51st annual meeting of the Protestant women of the city will be held in the Broadway Methodist Church.

Mrs. R. E. Royer will speak on "Keepers of the Temple" during the forenoon session and the Rev. F. W. Wiegmann, on "Freedom's Foundation—the Christian Home," in the afternoon. The Rev. Mr. Wiegmann has written various magazine articles on family life and the book, "Christian Happiness in the Home."

The Indianapolis Church Federation will conduct a study conference on World Order with Dr. Harold E. Fey of Chicago as guest speaker Apr. 29 in the Roberts Park Methodist Church.

Dr. Fey, who is managing editor of the Christian Century, will speak at the close of the sessions from 3 to 9 p. m.

Others active in the study conference will be Mrs. Howard Lytle, chairman of the foreign policy group of the League of Women Voters; Maurice Hunt of the State Welfare Department; and Miss Pauline French, director of adult education for the Central Library.

**Methodists Begin Mission Tonight**  
Dr. Gaston Foote To Preach Tomorrow

Ten full-sized billboards in different parts of Indianapolis proclaim the Methodist teaching—preaching mission beginning tonight at 7:30 o'clock in the Roberts Park Methodist Church.

The mission, planned for "peace of mind and soul," will continue through Friday at the same hour in the Roberts Park Church. Dr. Gaston Foote, pastor of the Grace Methodist Church, Dayton, O., will give the sermons. Dr. Foote is described as one of Methodism's "best pulpit orators."

The Rev. Charles R. Holmes, East Tenth Street Methodist Church pastor, is executive chairman of the mission. It represents a major evangelistic effort, the first step in the Methodist Advance program in this community.

While persons of all ages and both sexes are expected to attend all the meetings, special emphasis will be laid upon men's interests Monday night, those for young people on Tuesday night and for the Woman's Society of Christian Service Thursday night. A 6 o'clock dinner will precede the services Tuesday night. The Franklin Church Choir will sing tonight; the Irvington Church Choir, Tuesday; the Brightwood Church, Wednesday; and the choir of the host church, Thursday.

The Rev. Mr. Holmes explained that the mission will not be an old-fashioned Methodist revival but a "revival" of evangelistic spirit constitutes one of its goals. He predicted this new type revival will have as great an effect upon the city's religious life as some of the historic revivals held

The week-long mission will be followed during Holy Week by similar services in local churches.

# Cite Priesthood Birthday of Pope

Local Masses Mark Anniversary

The Most Rev. Paul C. Schulte and the faithful of the Indianapolis Catholic Archdiocese today are honoring the 50th anniversary of the ordination to the priesthood of His Holiness, Pope Pius XII.

To mark the occasion, archdiocesan priests were to say two masses today and the Blessed Sacrament was to be exposed for adoration in every church and chapel in the archdiocese.

Archbishop Schulte also sent a present to the Holy Father in the form of a "spiritual bouquet" and with it a letter written in Latin. The letter promises that the clergy, members of religious orders and the faithful of the archdiocese will redouble their efforts to prepare themselves for the coming holy year.

The art department of St. Mary-of-the-Woods College prepared the spiritual bouquet in elaborate manuscript style decorated with Archbishop Schulte's coat of arms in color. The bouquet is a record of masses attended, communions received and other acts of devotion.
