

Conway Clinches Tribe Shortstop Post

East All-Stars Squeak Past West, 65-64

Leo Barnhorst Gets 11 Points. In Fute Cause

NEW YORK, Apr. 2 (UP)—The East All-Stars, actually the Kentucky Wildcats in thin disguise, barely set down a blistering late rally to defeat the West, 65 to 64, in the annual charity classic concluding the basketball season at Madison Square Garden.

Coached by Kentucky's Adolph Rupp and using Wildcat players as the most potent guns in their attack, the East team turned on tremendous heat at the start of the second half to come from behind a 27 to 35 intermission deficit and pile up a 15-point lead.

But then the West, paced by Vern Mikkelsen's deadly shots from the outside, started its rally and a set shot by Notre Dame's Leo Barnhorst of Indianapolis with less than 15 seconds left to play brought them to within two points of the East. The time ran out, however.

Capacity Crowd

The game, witnessed by a capacity 18,341, was for the benefit of the New York Herald Tribune's fresh air fund—and it was a thriller all the way.

Rupp made this a Kentucky night, by starting four of his men along with Ernie Vandeweghe of Colgate. The boys had a little trouble getting started in the first half, mostly because Easy Ed McCauley of St. Louis did such a hand-to-fight job of guarding Alex Groza, holding Alex to a mere three points the first half while he collected nine for himself.

After the intermission, though, this Kentucky machine, just recently crowned N.C.A.A. champion, cut loose.

Mikkelsen wound up with 17 points for high honors—and he also collected the loudest cheers of the crowd, even though Groza was elected the game's outstanding player.

Barn led the East with 13 points, while Groza had 12 and Jones 11. Barnhorst had 11 for the West.

Canadiens Even Hockey Playoff

MONTREAL, Apr. 2 (UP)—The Montreal Canadiens scored three goals in the first 10 minutes of the second period to defeat the Detroit Red Wings, 3 to 1, tonight and even their National Hockey League semifinal playoff series at three games apiece.

A crowd of 12,500 at the Forum watched the Canadiens stave off elimination from the Stanley Cup playoffs on two goals by Gerry Plamondon and one by Maurice (The Rocket) Richard—all within the space of three minutes and 15 seconds.

Howe Scores The Red Wings came back with a tally by Gordon Howe three minutes later when Montreal had two men in the penalty box, but the Canadiens put up a stout defense from there to clinch the victory.

The teams will meet in the deciding game of the series at Detroit, Tuesday night, for the right to meet the Toronto Maple Leafs in the best-of-seven game Stanley Cup finals.

A total of 10 penalties were called, one a major to Howe for cutting Kenny Reardon of the Canadiens with a high stick in the final period and another to Harry Lumley for shooting the puck into the crowd in the opening session. Lee Fogolin served Lumley's penalty.
