

10th Air Force Selects ROTC Training Site

Scott, Chanute, Laurie Fields To Be Used

Camps for training Air Force ROTC students from colleges and universities in the 12-state area controlled by the 10th Air Force will be held this summer at Scott and Chanute Air Force bases in Illinois and at Laurie Field in Colorado.

From June 27 until Aug. 7 students will receive training in armaments, transportation, statistical control communications and aircraft maintenance.

About 180 cadets from five Indiana institutions will qualify for attendance if they are first year advanced air ROTC students.

AIR NATIONAL Guardsmen at Stout Field have two additions to their training squadrons with the arrival of two C-47 ships at the base. Both were flown from California by Stout Field pilots.

Further expansion of the 113th Fighter Squadron, Indiana Air National Guard, has been authorized by National Guard Headquarters in Washington. More pilots will be added to the unit to train "Mustang" fighters.

Capt. Jack Fehsenfeld, squadron commander, will interview pilots with combat fighter experience tomorrow night in Hanger 5, Stout Field.

Major Vincent Grannan, assistant pastor of Holy Trinity Catholic Church, has been named chaplain of the Stout Field Fighter Group. His last duty station before returning to this country was Nichols Field, Japan.

TWO AIR guardsmen have been accepted for training at the Cooks and Bakers School, Ft. Sheridan, Ill.

Pfc. Clarence Davis, 320 N. Layman Ave., and Pvt. Harold Johnson, 1524 Kenyon Ave., will serve as cooks during the guard's summer encampment after completing the 12-week course.

Logging More Hours
ARRIVAL of spring in Indiana has boosted flight hours logged by Air Reservists here. Administration officers reported 242 hours flown by Stout Field pilots last week end.

Nine states will be represented at the sectional meeting of the Women's Licensed Pilots International organization, to be held Apr. 23 and Apr. 24 in Louisville, Ky. New officers will be elected.

Strictly a female group, the organization is composed of pilots active in aviation. It was organized by Amelia Earhart.

THE NEWLY FORMED 52d Wing Staff Civil Air Patrol is activating squadrons in Frankfort, Anderson, Bedford, Evansville, Rushville, Brazil and Shelbyville.

Wing officers estimate that 92 squadrons will be necessary to bring their unit up to a complement of 9500. Applications are accepted at wing headquarters, Old Trails building, Indianapolis.

Col. Clarence Cornish of the State Aeronautics Commission said yesterday that no fatal accidents involving unscheduled civil aircraft have been recorded in the past two months. Since Nov. 1, 1948, only two accidents have occurred with three persons killed, he said.

Col. Cornish will attend a meeting of the National Safety Council, Thursday in Chicago. He is chairman of the council.

A LINK trainer unit sponsored by the Aeronautics Commission will be at Ben Davis High School tomorrow and Tuesday as part of the commission's youth air education program.

A REQUEST by Porter County Municipal Airport for federal funds to be used for improvements will be considered at a hearing before the State Aeronautics Commission tomorrow.

The colorful ring of trees circling the tidal basin burst into full bloom several days ago and were kept alive for the week-end by a warm spell.

Belmont Secretary Louis A. Johnson opened the two-day carnival this afternoon by crowning pretty Judy Queen of Billings, Mont., as queen of the festival.

The weather man contributed an almost perfect day for the occasion, with clear skies and temperatures in the upper 50s.

MISS QUEEN was chosen over 50 other beauties representing the 48 states and the territories at the annual Cherry Blossom Ball last night.

A pageant, water carnival and concert followed the coronation ceremonies.

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60,000 Youths Sing for Pope At Jubilee

Pontiff Moved By Tribute on 50th Anniversary

VATICAN CITY, Apr. 2 (UP)—Sixty thousand singing school children paid tribute to Pope Pius XII on the 50th anniversary of his priesthood today in an outdoor celebration in the Vatican's Belvedere courtyard.

The turnout far surpassed expectations. The children waved yellow and white flowers and chanted a welcoming hymn when the Pope appeared in the courtyard.

The two children of Italian Education Minister Guido Gonella presented the Pontiff with a small traveling altar, and other students offered cakes and flowers.

Visibly Moved
The Pope, visibly moved by the children's tribute, spoke briefly of the throne and urged the students to follow the teachings of Jesus.

He spent the rest of his "golden mass" day in prayer and quiet meditation.

Pope Pius will be honored tomorrow when the College of Cardinals, the Papal Court, high states and members of the diplomatic corps accredited to the Vatican will celebrate a solemn Te Deum in the Basilica of St. Mary Major to commemorate the golden jubilee.

First Time in Century
It was in the Church of St. Mary Major that the Pope was ordained Apr. 2, 1899, by Monsignor Francesco De Paolo Cassella, and it was also in the Borghese Chapel that he said his first mass on Apr. 3.

Tomorrow morning the Pope will pray before the lofty Altar of the Confession in St. Peter's for the first time since his coronation 10 years ago when he leads an expected throng of 40,000 worshippers in an unprecedented double mass.

It will mark the first time in a century that any Pope has offered mass from the ornate altar which rises above the tomb of St. Peter.

The Pope has given instructions that the unprecedented ceremony be observed on Passion Sunday in all Catholic churches throughout the world.

Child Health Program Set

NEW YORK, Apr. 2 (UP)—Plans for a nation-wide action program for improvement of child health were announced tonight by the American Academy of Pediatrics.

The program will be based on the findings of a three-year \$1 million study of child care.

Dr. Warren R. Sisson, president of the Academy, said the study was the most comprehensive inventory of the nation's health service ever undertaken, and will enable health authorities to know, for the first time, the individual needs of local communities.

The new plan is designed to put modern techniques and facilities at the disposal of the physician wherever he may be, Dr. Sisson said.
