Hoosier Lost Life
in Germany Action

Services for Pvt. Fred Edgar Keesling, killed April 9, 1945 by a sniper while on guard duty in Germany, will be held at noon tomorrow in Crownland Cemetery, Noblesville.

Pvt. Keesling was a graduate of Lawrence Central High School. He was employed in Allison Division of General Motors before he entered service June 7, 1944. He arrived overseas in November 1944.

Born near Castleton, he was a member of the Lawrence Methodist Church and the Mystic Circle, F&AM, Lawrence.

Surviving are a son, James Edgar, E. Lansing, Mich.; his father, and stepmother, Oris E. Keesling and Mrs. Ruth Keesling, Indianapolis, and a brother, Harvey Keesling, Indianapolis.

Chairman in 1937

General chairman of the national convention in 1937, Mrs. Hahn was elected first vice president in 1943 and served until her death as chairman of the medals committee of the American War Mothers.
