Blackwood on Bridge—Grand Slam Force Provides Dramatic, Spectacular Bid

A dramatic and spectacular bid was used by Mr. Masters to reach a grand slam on today's hand. I refer to the Culbertson Grand Slam Force.

This bid is not usable frequently but when the proper situation for its use occurs, it is a potent and profitable device. It can readily be used in conjunction with the Blackwood Slam Convention.

The Grand Slam Force is used for only one purpose—to find out if partner has any two of the three top honors in the agreed trump suit. That is, A-K, Q-J, or A-Q. You ask partner for this information by jumping directly to five no trump, omitting the four no trump bid entirely.

In response to this special five no trump call partner must do one of two things. If he has two of the three top trump honors he bids seven in the agreed suit. If he does not have two of the three top trump honors he bids six in the agreed suit.

Grand Slam Is Cold

After Mr. Champion jumped to four spades in the deal shown above there was only one question in Mr. Masters' mind. He was not worried about a diamond loser. On the bidding it seemed almost certain that Mr. Champion had the king of diamonds or the king of clubs, either of which would serve as a parking place for the losing diamond in the South hand.

What Mr. Masters wanted most to know was whether his partner had the ace and the queen of spades. So he used the Grand Slam Force, bidding five no trumps over Mr. Champion's four spade bid.

Mr. Champion heard his partner's "question" and he answered it—properly, of course. He knew he was being required to bid either six or seven spades, depending on his spade holding. Having two top spade honors he put the hand in a grand slam which was so cold that even Mr. Muzzy would have made it.
