Other witnesses had, hardly more than kaleidoscopic glimpses of the action that flashed about crowded Monument Circle as guns boomed through the spring evening.

Sees Man Pointing Gun

Waiter S. Stone, 35, of 1904 W. 57th St., didn't know what was happening when a man came running toward his automobile as he drove around the southeast segment of the Circle past the Circle Theater.

"I hardly noticed him at first," he said. "People were scattering everywhere while the guns went off."

"First thing I knew, this guy (Johnson) was out in the middle of the street pointing his gun at me."

"Fortunately, I had my door locked on the right side. I ducked down, practically on the floor. He hit at my door window, then ran around back of my car."

"When I was sure he was gone I got out onto the street and lay down beside the car. Two shots hit the back of my car, both fired by the FBI, I guess."

Shooting Into Crowd

"I sure was hoping that guy would run out of lead. He (Johnson) was shooting directly into the crowd."

Fred Cheneau, 15, of 2402 S. California St., and his three youthful companions were directly in the line of fire as they stood at the foot of Soldiers and Sailors Monument.

17 British Sloop Dead Buried at Sea

SHANGHAI, Apr. 22 (UPI)—The shell-battered British sloop Amethyst buried 17 of its dead at sea today and crept another four miles up the Yangtze River toward Nanking under a rain of Communist artillery fire.

Police arrested the three youths at their South Side homes early this morning.

(Continued From Page One) was about when Johnson nearly knocked them down.

Both stood on the sidewalk, not 10 feet from the taxicab into which Johnson had jumped, and watched as an FBI agent ran up to the cab and stuck his gun through the open window of the right rear door.

"At no time was he threatening, nor did he give any indication of using his gun," Dr. Parker said.

Both she and Dr. Parker said they weren't worried about the bandit's gun.

"The agent fired one shot directly into Johnson's chest. Two other FBI men ran up behind the rear of the cab as I pulled away, with bank-robbing Johnson urging cab-driver Johnson on to greater speed at pistol point."

Nurse Unfussed By Bandit Episode

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Most persons on the Circle thought it was automobile backfire.

One bullet fired from Johnson's gun went through the plate glass window of the Circle Tower.

Twice Johnson tried to commandeer a car, but failed. Then he turned into Market St. and saw a cab.
