**Businesses Advised
To Shift Bookkeeping**
The Indiana State Chamber of Commerce today warned business men to make a shift in their bookkeeping on July 1, the date increased gross income taxes go into effect.

Both employers and employees were urged to separate their bookkeeping before and after July 1 in order to compute the increased tax for the last half of the year.

Personal taxes will increase from 1 per cent to 1.25 per cent and the rate on retail sales will increase from one-half of 1 per cent to .625 per cent, and the wholesale rate will go from one-fourth of 1 per cent to one-half of 1 per cent.

The increase was voted by the last legislature to pay the Soldiers' bonus.

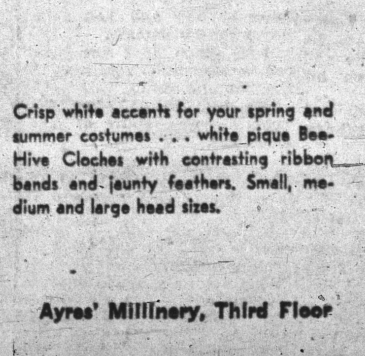
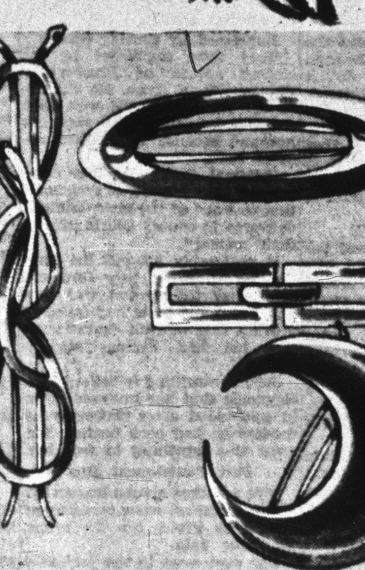
