## Newhouser Runs Ahead Of 30-Victory Timetable

**Detroit Southpaw Off to Best Start Of Career After 3-2 Win at Cleveland**

NEW YORK, May 2—Lefty Hal Newhouser was ahead of schedule today on the pitching time-table he hopes will bring him his most cherished goal in baseball—a 30-victory season.

The Detroit ace figures he could hit that mark by winning a little better than a game a week and, with less than two weeks out of the season completed, he already has a 3-1 mark.

That's the best start of his career, even better than in 1944 when he won 29 games and lost but nine, just missing the magic mark which no big league pitcher has hit since Dizzy Dean of the Cards had a 30-7 season in 1934.

No American League pitcher has had a 30-game season in 18 years, Lefty Grove of the Athletics being the last with his incredible 31-4 season in 1931.

Yesterday at Detroit he won a 3 to 2 duel from Bob Lemon of Cleveland, who gave up only two hits. But one of those Tiger hits was a three-run first inning homer by Dick Wakefield and that gave Newhouser all the help he needed.

He gave up eight hits, including two doubles and two triples.

The White Sox, who have won seven of their eight victories from the Browns, moved into second place at the expense of their Missouri cousins whom they defeated 7 to 6 and 14 to 11. They won the second game despite an eight-run ninth inning rally by St. Louis. The usually anemic Chicago batsmen contributed four homers by Luke Appling and Bud Souchock in the opener and by rookie Jerry Scia and Cass Michaels in the second game.

At New York the Yankees suffered their first home defeat after seven victories, the Red Sox winning an 11 to 2 decision as Ted Williams hit a grand slam homer and Vern Stephens and Johnny Pesky got two run homers.

The Athletics crushed the Senators twice, 15 to 9 and 7 to 4, at Philadelphia. Elmer Valo batted in seven runs in the first game with two grand slam triples and a single.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 2 (UP)—That dizzy tizzy known as Derby Week struck Louisville today.

Nickel beer was shunned in favor of the dollar julep, and folks who can't tell a fetlock from a French 75 suddenly became learned horse fanciers for the diamond jubilee of America's premier horse race.

The first event on the big program, this 75th running of the Kentucky Derby, is the Derby Trial tomorrow, a one mile race opened to all Derby eligibles. Six horses were scheduled to start in the warm-up, and for at least two of them the trial performance will determine whether they answer the call to the colors for the big race Saturday.

The present lineup for the trial is Fred Hooper's Ocean Drive, Calumet Farm's entry of Ponder and DeLuxe, Greentree Stable's Capot, A. P. Cotter's Petey Cotter and L. L. Jenkins' Jackstown. For dark horses Petey Cotter and Jackstown, the trial is the supreme test.

The Derby favorite, Olympia, owned by Hooper, probably will not run tomorrow.

MINNEAPOLIS, May 2—Invading the Twin Cities, the American Association's stronghold as of today, the Indianapolis Indians, the defending champs, were whipped into a frenzy with only one thing in mind—to throw a road block in the path of the Millers and Saints.

The Redskins tackle the Millers first, tonight, in the opener of a two-game series, and on Wednesday they move across the river to battle the soaring Saints.

The Saints have won 10 games without a defeat this season, the Millers also have won 10, with three defeats.

Defeated in Indianapolis

But the Millers also have won 10 in a row and haven't been defeated since the Indians handed them a 5-to-3 setback in Indianapolis on April 21.

Then the following day, on April 22, the Millers downed the Tribe, 10 to 2, to launch their long victory march.

Tribe Manager Al Lopez indicated he would start young Joe Murr, southpaw on the mound against Tommy Heath's Mill City nine under the Nicollet Park lights tonight.

Three-Way Tie

The Indians, deadlocked with Milwaukee and Kansas City for third place, are three games behind Minneapolis and 4½ games behind league-leading St. Paul.
