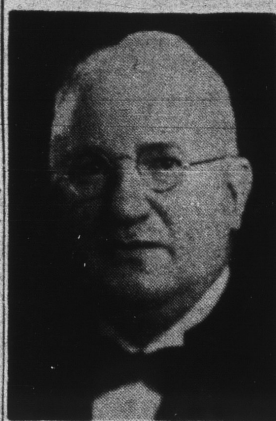
Lived Here 21 Years
