

Clues Revive Probe of Mystery Death

Hint Possibility
Of Foul Play
In 1947 Drowning

CRAWFORDSVILLE, May 5—Discovery of a pipe and a billfold which belonged to a Crawfordsville man whose body was found in a shallow stream here two years ago led to renewed investigation of the unsolved death.

Sheriff Roy Hardaker revealed that the pipe and billfold, identified as the property of William (Bill) Newlin, whose death a coroner had reported due to drowning, were found in the home of a woman arrested in connection with a local theft.

The woman, held at Lebanon because the Montgomery County jail does not have suitable facilities, and a man who lived in the same residence, held here, are being questioned in connection with Newlin's death.

Hunt Robbery Motive
Newlin, 72-year-old trash collector, had between \$50 and \$60 in his possession immediately before his body was found in the shallow stream here on April 6, 1947, according to his widow.

Sheriff Hardaker, who was a deputy sheriff at the time, has continued to work on the case, believing the trash man may have been murdered for his money.

Although it was established that death was due to drowning, authorities said Newlin may have been robbed and thrown into the stream. One shoe was found some distance from the bank and the pipe and billfold were missing.

Sgt. M. L. Farmer Rites Tomorrow

Killed in Action
On Marshall Island

Services for Sgt. Marion L. Farmer, who was killed in action in the Marshall Islands Jan. 3, 1944, will be at 3 p. m. tomorrow in Evans, Godby & Trout Funeral Home, Noblesville. Burial will be in Crownland Cemetery. He was 23.

Sgt. Farmer died while serving as an aerial engineer on an Army bomber. He enlisted in the Army Air Force Oct. 30, 1941, was transferred to Hawaii in 1942 and shifted to aerial gunnery in 1943.

He was the son of Verner H. Farmer, 1037 W. 34th St., and Mrs. Esther L. Farmer of Noblesville. A native of Noblesville, he was employed by Cuneo Press in Chicago before his enlistment. He attended Chicago Technical Institute where he studied electrical drafting.

Surviving beside his parents is a sister, Miss Cledith Farmer, Indianapolis.

Legion Condemns Hoover Group

Brands Commission's
Report 'Dictatorial'

On the eve of ceremonies commemorating the erection of a permanent national headquarters here, the American Legion condemned the Hoover Commission's proposal to streamline the federal government.

Branding the commission's personnel report "dictatorial," the Legion's executive committee declared that it would "rob 14 million GI's of government jobs by destroying veterans' preference."

At the same time, the Legion urged stronger loyalty checks on government jobholders.

Johnson to Speak
The American Legion leaders also were making elaborate preparations to welcome U. S. Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson, who will arrive at 11 a. m. tomorrow at the Weir Cook Municipal Airport.

Secretary Johnson will be the principal speaker at the cornerstone laying ceremony of the Legion's headquarters building.

Among the dignitaries expected to greet the Defense Secretary are Gov. Schricker, Mayor Feeney, Maj. Gen Paul L. Williams, commander of the 10th Air Force, Col. Roscoe Turner, famed speed pilot and Maj. Gen Harry F. Vaughn, military aide to President Truman.

The nationally famous Tenth Army band will perform when Sec. Johnson alights from his plane.

Parade Scheduled
An hour-long parade downtown will precede the Legion ceremonies at 1 p. m.

Legion posts, high school bands, ROTC detachments and National Guard units will march from Pennsylvania and South St., swinging south to Market St., east to Monument Circle and proceed north on Meridian St.

Formations of jet fighter planes and bombers will form an air cover umbrella over the parade route.

The ceremonies will climax the annual spring meeting of the Legion's executive committee.
