New Deal 'Bright Boy' Denies Election Fraud

LEXINGTON, Ky., May 5 (UP)—Edward F. Prichard Jr., once known as the "Bright Boy of the New Deal" asked for a speedy trial today to prove that he is innocent of election fraud charges.

Mr. Prichard and his law partner, A. E. Funk Jr., son of Kentucky's attorney general, waived formal arraignment yesterday and entered innocent pleas. Each was held in \$5000 bail.

Mr. Prichard was formerly law clerk for United States Supreme Court Justice Felix Frankfurter and Special Assistant to Justice Robert H. Jackson and War Mobilization Director Fred Vinson, now Chief Justice. His Summa Cum Laude honors from Princeton and Harvard rated him high among New Deal intelligentsia.
