

UAW Accepts Bid to Resume Ford 'Talks'

Gov. Williams, Dearborn Mayor Asked to 'Sit In'

DETROIT, May 7 (UP)—The CIO United Auto Workers' union today accepted an invitation to a meeting to attempt settlement of the Ford Motor Co. strike, which threatens imminent shutdown of Ford plants and supply firms throughout the nation.

The union's acceptance came after the company announced plans for plant shutdowns in 16 states within 10 days.

Walter Reuther, UAW president, agreed to meet next Thursday with Mayor Orville Hubbard of Dearborn, where Ford's River Rouge plant is located. Mayor Hubbard also invited Gov. G. Mennen Williams and Henry Ford II, company president.

Gov. Williams said he would attend the meeting "if it would serve any useful purpose." Mr. Ford had not yet replied. Mayor Hubbard has been at odds with the company since it supported an attempt of a life insurance company to bring a large housing project to Dearborn.

Mr. Ford had said earlier that the company was willing to negotiate further at any time.

Mr. Reuther's acceptance marked the first break toward resumption of negotiations, which ended shortly after noon Thursday when 62,200 employees of Ford's Rouge and Lincoln-Mercury plants struck over an alleged speedup.

The company, which draws on every state for supplies and equipment, announced plans to close 18 auto and truck assembly plants by May 15 if the strike continues.

Production to Start On New Machine

Servel, Inc., of Evansville will prepare this week to move into production on a new ice cube making machine developed by the Packard Manufacturing Co., owned by Sen. Homer E. Capehart, on a lease-royalty basis.

The device, which turns out 316 ice cubes per hour automatically, will be used in hotels, bars, cafeterias and refreshment parlors. It keeps its ice bin full, and shuts off when filled.

Ownership of the patent rights is divided between the Capehart firm and Icecraft, Inc., of Chicago. No price was announced in the lease to Servel, Inc., but it is expected that it will yield more than \$100,000.

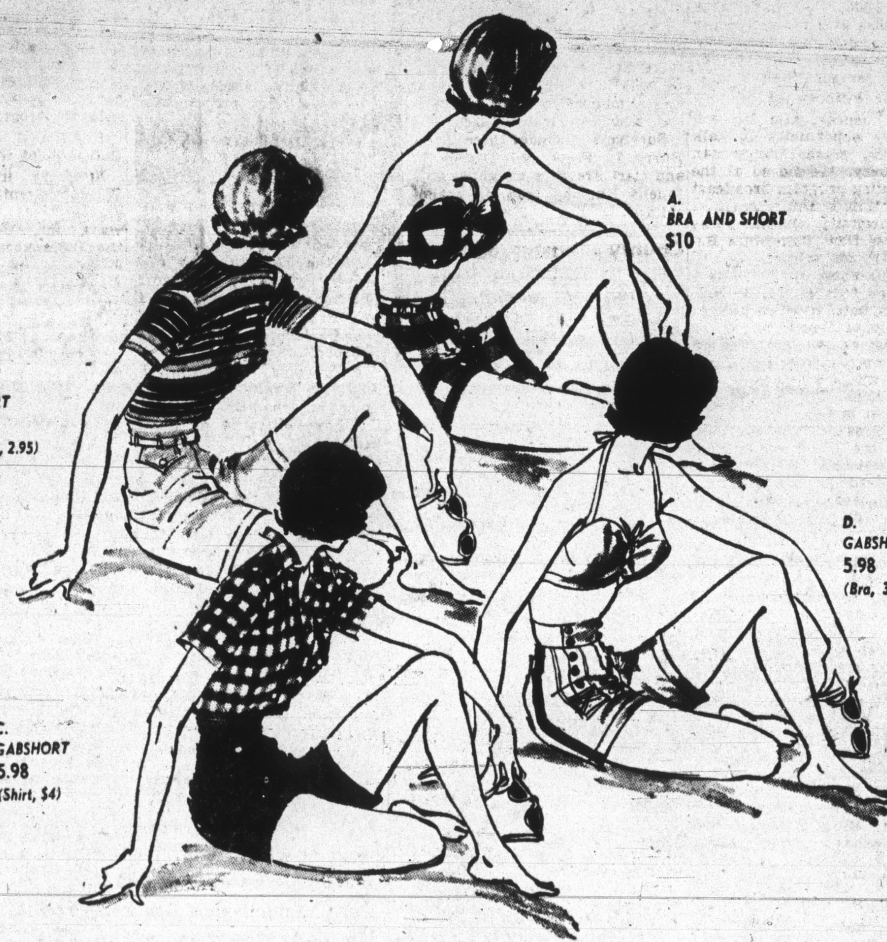
