

Jacobs Seeks To Draft New Labor Law

Takes Issue With McGrath, Hopes to Get 'Good Bill'

WASHINGTON, May 9.—Rep. Andrew Jacobs, Indianapolis Democrat, today is trying to help draft a new labor law which he hopes will be acceptable to both Congress and President Truman. The freshman Congressman from Marion County took sharp issue with a statement issued by the Democratic National Committee over the signature of Chairman J. Howard McGrath. This statement suggested that Taft-Hartley law repeal may still be an issue in the 1950 Congressional campaigns.

"If circumstances and political log-rolling should block such a program in this Congress, I am confident that in 1950 the voters will find a way to make their wishes in labor legislation clear to everyone and to insure passage of the type of labor legislation for which they voted last November," the McGrath statement said.

Elected "To Do Job" "That sounds like irresponsible talk to me," Mr. Jacobs commented. "We were elected to do a job and not just to try and get re-elected. We are pledged to replace as well as repeal the Taft-Hartley law. I think we still can get a good bill."

Mr. Jacobs and Rep. Ray Madden, Gary Democrat, debated Senate Robert A. Taft (R. O.) and Irving M. Ives (R. N. Y.) on the labor law issue over Blair Moody's "Meet Your Congress" program televised and broadcast last night.

Mr. Madden, member of the House Rules Committee, led the fight for the administration in opening the House debates, which finally resulted in sending the labor bill back to committee. He also expressed the hope that a new law can be passed, but expects the initiative to come from the Senate this time, he said today.

Analysts Opponents Arguing for his latest measure with 28 changes in the Taft-Hartley Law, Sen. Taft bitterly assailed union opposition and chose the International Typographical Union to particularly criticize over the airways.

"The printers' union dominates 2000 employers," Sen. Taft charged. "It is one of the most arbitrary unions in the United States. I know that in Ohio they will not let a man take a job in a union shop if he has learned the trade in a non-union one."

'COUGH DROP KING' DIES ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 9 (UP)—William H. Liden, 60, the "cough drop king" who began his million-dollar business as a candy-maker, died at his home here yesterday. He founded Liden, Inc., Reading, Pa., cough drop firm, which he sold for a reported \$6.5 million in 1927.
