Fair to Portray
Haiti's Progress

200th Anniversary of

Port-au-Prince Marked

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti, May 18—Backward Haiti is taking a determined step into tomorrow.

The government of this black Caribbean republic is rushing construction of an international exposition which it hopes to open in December to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the Founding of Port-Au-Prince.

In sharp contrast with the primitive, easy-going life of the country's three-million-odd natives, the world's fair is designed to display the latest achievements of a frenzied civilization which may not have so much on the Haitians, at that.

Swamps Reclaimed

Already American contractors have reclaimed 60 acres of waterfront swamps which not long ago were the sites of this capital city's worst slums, and have laid out what undoubtedly will be a beautiful bayfront boulevard.

Several of the projected 56 exposition buildings are well along toward completion. The so-called "Folklore Section"—typical Haiti complete with voodoo temple and cockfight arena in the shade of towering royal palms—promises to become a permanent tourist attraction.

Exposition officials say France, Italy, Belgium, Cuba and Venezuela already have agreed to sponsor exhibits and that many other countries, including the United States, are expected to sign up shortly.
