Eight Local Players Holding Coveted Rating Of Life Bridge Master Bring Fame To Indianapolis As One Of Nation's Top Contract Cities

IF CITIES WERE ranked by their number of bridge experts instead of by population, Indianapolis would be at the top of the heap.

Our Fair City claims eight life bridge masters. That's the highest honor a contract player can receive—an award that comes after winning 300 points in special play. Thirty of these must be won in national tournaments or 50 in regional ones. Pitted against the top players in the United States and Canada, the winners just have to be "good."

The local persons who've made the grade are Edson T. Woods, Lawrence J. Welch, M. Stanley McComas, Mr. and Mrs. George Ryan, Roland Buck, Richard Lee and Joseph Cain. And they value the small gold card that signifies the end of the long, hard pull more than any of the trophies they've won in championship play.

There are only 200 life masters in the country and Canada. As would be expected, New York "owns" a sizable chunk—49; Philadelphia follows with 19; Chicago has 17; Los Angeles, 10; and Cincinnati, 9. Indianapolis' eight, according to population, gives it reason to puff out its chest.

path toward the honor is the championship tournament last year by Edson T. Woods. Thirty-ninth life master in the country, Mr. Woods lost the national open pair championship at Miami-Beach by four tenths of a point.

He's a consistent winner at most events though, copping top honors at the Indiana State team of four championship this year, the Faber cup for another

Some of the life masters show skill at the outset of their careers. Like M. Stanley McComas. He won the first two tournaments he ever played—the Indiana State Pair Championship and the Team of Four championship. His gold card was won in the spring of 1948.

Other new members of the group are Mr. and Mrs. George Ryan, a team which won fame by playing with each other and winning. That's a jinx which few bridge-playing husbands and wives have risked.

Joseph Cain has a string of championships behind him, his master rating. He won the national pair in 1933 and was a member of the national team of four championship team in 1935.

Life master in January, 1948, was a member of the all-American team of four in Chicago in 1942 and won the Indiana State Team of Four championship four times.

Lawrence J. Welch became a life master in January, 1947. He's the favorite partner of Roland Buck, who reached the 300-mark this spring.
