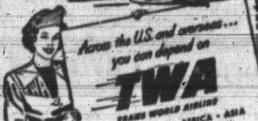

Services Planned For Lt. Bender

Jet Pilot Killed in N. Carolina Crash

Services were being arranged for First Lt. Fletcher Bender, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Bender, 923 N. Denny St., who was found beside his wrecked, pursuit plane near a North Carolina river yesterday. He was 32.

Lt. Bender was killed when his P-80 jet plane crashed near Roanoke Rapids, N. C., and exploded. He has been missing since he took off on a routine training flight Sunday.

Born in Illinois
A native of Herrick, Ill., Lt. Bender joined the Air Force in 1940, before his parents moved to Indianapolis. He returned to the United States last January after several years of occupational duty in Japan and previous wartime service in the China-Burma-India theater.

A graduate of the Wisconsin State Teachers College, Platteville, Wis., Lt. Bender taught school at Hendrick and Cowden, Ill. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

Surviving in addition to his parents are his wife, Mrs. Jane Bender, his daughter, Grace, and his grandmother, Mrs. J. H. Fletcher, Indianapolis.

Charles H. Darden
Services for Charles H. Darden, who died Tuesday, while working on a water line at a Speedway City home, will be at 1 p. m. tomorrow in Patton Crystal Chapel.

Born in Tennessee, Mr. Darden lived in Indianapolis 15 years. He made his home here at 1053 Eugene St. He was 54. He was an employee of the Woodward Plumbing Co.

He is survived by his sister, Mrs. Ora Lee Trotter; a brother, George Darden, both of Indianapolis; five nephews and two nieces.

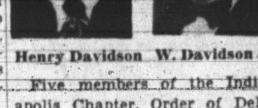
Five Will Get DeMolay Honors



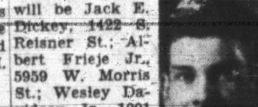
