DR. ANSWERS—

Question: Is it dangerous for a person with hardening of the arteries to take calcium preparations with Viosterol?

Answer: Taking calcium and viosterol in the presence of arteriosclerosis is probably not particularly advisable. There is some doubt, however, as to whether it is actually harmful.

Question: What makes the heart feel as though it were jumping or turning over?

Answer: The most likely explanation is that the heart has some extra beats which are known medically as extra systoles. This is not ordinarily a dangerous condition, but if it occurs frequently it would be wise to have your heart examined.
